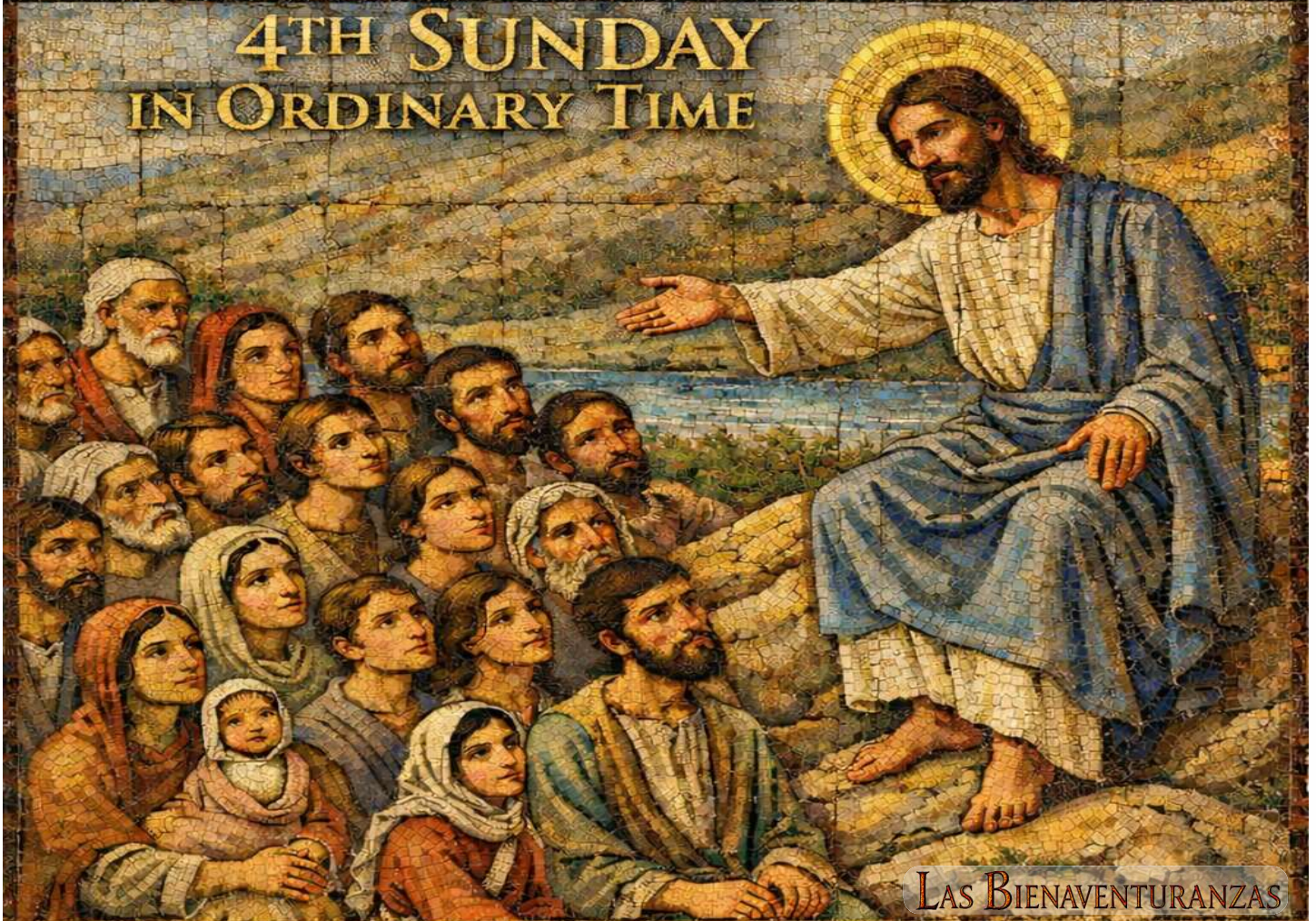

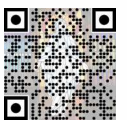

Saint Colette
(January 13, 1381 – March 6, 1447)

Saint Colette did not seek the limelight, but in doing God's will she certainly attracted a lot of attention. Colette was born in Corbie, France. At 21, she began to follow the Third Order Rule and became an

anchoress, a woman walled into a room whose only opening was a window into a church. After four years of prayer and penance in this cell, she left it. With the approval and encouragement of the pope, she joined the Poor Clares and reintroduced the primitive Rule of St. Clare in the 17 monasteries she established. Her sisters were known for their poverty—they rejected any fixed income—and for their perpetual fast. Colette's reform movement spread to other countries and is still thriving today. Colette was canonized in 1807. Her liturgical feast is celebrated on March 6.

Reflection

Colette began her reform during the time of the Great Western Schism (1378-1417) when three men claimed to be pope and thus divided Western Christianity. The 15th century in general was a very difficult one for the Western Church. Abuses long neglected cost the Church dearly in the following century. Colette's reform indicated the entire Church's need to follow Christ more closely.

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY



February 1, 2026
4th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY
TIME: BLESSED ARE WE

This is one of those Sundays when all the readings and the prayers of the Liturgy focus on a single theme: what it means to live faithful to the Word of God. The prophet Zephaniah tells the people of Israel – and us – that we are to seek the Lord, to seek justice and humility, taking refuge in the Lord. Paul tells the people of Corinth – and us – that we are to look to standards of faith in God and follow the ways of Christ Jesus. In the Gospel Jesus gives his disciples – and us – the “Blessed are...” statements.

These early weeks of Ordinary Time introduce us to the call of the disciples and the work of discipleship according to the teachings of Jesus. Matthew’s telling of the Beatitudes as the early and central teachings of Jesus places the event on a mountain, – which the Jewish community could immediately recognize as a fulfillment and furthering of the first commandments given through Moses on a mountain at the time of the Exodus. The Blessed statements and the “Sermon on the Mount” would thus be understood as the “new Commandments” of the New Covenant.

Perhaps one of the helpful ways of checking out how we are living the beatitudes is to ask ourselves where our treasure is. To be poor in spirit does not mean to be poor economically, financially; it is more about our attitude toward both riches and being poor. There are many ways of living in the spirit and reality of the beatitudes: to be alert and responsive to the needs of others, to be attentive to those people and situations that we can impact positively; to be generous with what we have – our time, our talents, thoughtfulness, skills and material goods. To be merciful and peacemakers is call to keep front and center in our hearts, choices and conversations the knowledge of God’s goodness, mercy and love for us and for all his creation.

Living the beatitudes can evoke in us a deeper dependence on God and the community, for it is together that we become ever more faithfully the disciples whom God has called. Particularly on Sundays when we gather as a community of faith to celebrate Eucharist, we are able to re-discover the power of the Eucharist to nourish us to live the Gospel life each and every day!

THE KINGDOM OF HAPPINESS



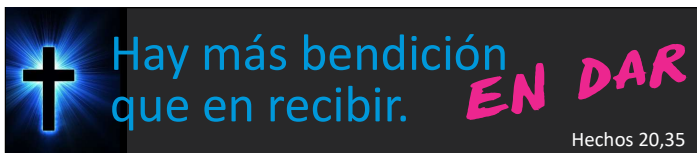
Sometimes we think of the beatitudes as idealistic and rather out of touch with the real daily lives

of most of us. Yet, here they are, in the early teachings of Jesus, in the Gospel of Matthew (chapter 5) and a bit differently in the Gospel of Luke (chapter 6).

Several years ago, I encountered and came to deeply appreciate the wisdom of Father Jeffrey Kirby, author of a book titled *THE KINGDOM OF HAPPINESS, LIVING THE BEATITUDES IN DAILY LIFE*. Sharing the book with a team of catechists and friends, our discussions led us to understand more deeply these teachings as challenges as well as blessings.

A few opening points offered by the author make a lot of sense, especially in the context of our lives today. When we understand happiness as more closely related to peace of heart and joy, there is a strong element of faith within happiness. We are not alone in our desire and search for happiness: there is something “hardwired” within us seeking happiness. Happiness is possible, but it may not be easy to seek, find or maintain. Being happy is a decision, a choice in dealing with the realities of life. God does the heavy lifting; as Christians, we find that in and through our faith in Jesus Christ. Persons of wisdom and faith are our companions on the way – and God may invite us to be that companion for another person, too!

Through the lens of faith, enlightened by hope and love, nourished by our community of faith and our own personal life of prayer, we can find ways to live and celebrate each day’s challenges as blessings, and readily give thanks for the day’s graces, knowing that God is with us all along the way.



Bienaventurados son ...

Este es uno de esos domingos en los que todas las lecturas y las oraciones de la Liturgia se centran en un solo tema: lo que significa vivir fieles a la Palabra de Dios. El profeta Sofonías dice al pueblo de Israel —y a nosotros— que debemos buscar al Señor, buscar la justicia y la humildad,

refugiándonos en el Señor. Pablo dice al pueblo de Corinto —y a nosotros— que debemos mirar a los criterios de la fe en Dios y seguir los caminos de Cristo Jesús. En el Evangelio, Jesús da a sus discípulos —y a nosotros— las declaraciones de «Bienaventurados...».

Estas primeras semanas del Tiempo Ordinario nos introducen en la llamada de los discípulos y en la tarea del discipulado según las enseñanzas de Jesús. La narración que hace Mateo de las Bienaventuranzas como enseñanzas iniciales y centrales de Jesús sitúa el acontecimiento en un monte, lo cual la comunidad judía podía reconocer de inmediato como cumplimiento y continuación de los primeros mandamientos dados por medio de Moisés en un monte en el tiempo del Éxodo. Las declaraciones de las Bienaventuranzas y el «Sermón de la Montaña» serían así entendidos como los «nuevos Mandamientos» de la Nueva Alianza.

Quizá una de las maneras más útiles de comprobar cómo estamos viviendo las Bienaventuranzas sea preguntarnos dónde está nuestro tesoro. Ser pobres de espíritu no significa ser pobres económica o financieramente; se trata más bien de nuestra actitud tanto ante la riqueza como ante la pobreza. Hay muchas maneras de vivir en el espíritu y en la realidad de las Bienaventuranzas: estar atentos y responder a las necesidades de los demás, ser sensibles a las personas y situaciones en las que podemos influir positivamente; ser generosos con lo que tenemos —nuestro tiempo, nuestros talentos, nuestra consideración, nuestras habilidades y nuestros bienes materiales—. Ser misericordiosos y constructores de paz es una llamada a mantener en primer plano, en nuestros corazones, decisiones y conversaciones, el conocimiento de la bondad, la misericordia y el amor de Dios por nosotros y por toda su creación.

Vivir las Bienaventuranzas puede suscitar en nosotros una dependencia más profunda de Dios y de la comunidad, pues es juntos como llegamos a ser cada vez más fielmente los discípulos a los que Dios ha llamado. Especialmente los domingos, cuando nos reunimos como comunidad de fe para celebrar la Eucaristía, podemos redescubrir el poder de la Eucaristía para alimentarnos y vivir la vida del Evangelio cada día.

A veces pensamos en las bienaventuranzas como algo idealista y bastante alejado de la vida diaria real de la mayoría de nosotros. Sin embargo, aquí están, en las primeras enseñanzas de Jesús, en el Evangelio de Mateo (capítulo 5) y de manera un poco diferente en el Evangelio de Lucas (capítulo 6).

Hace varios años, conocí y llegué a apreciar profundamente la sabiduría del Padre Jeffrey Kirby, autor de un libro titulado *EL REINO DE LA FELICIDAD, VIVIR LAS BIENAVENTURANZAS EN LA VIDA DIARIA*. Al compartir el libro con un equipo de catequistas y amigos, nuestras conversaciones nos llevaron a comprender más profundamente estas enseñanzas como desafíos además de bendiciones.

Algunos puntos iniciales ofrecidos por el autor tienen mucho sentido, especialmente en el contexto de nuestras vidas hoy. Cuando entendemos la felicidad como algo más relacionado con la paz del corazón y el gozo, existe un fuerte elemento de fe dentro de la felicidad. No estamos solos en nuestro deseo y búsqueda de la felicidad: hay algo “programado” dentro de nosotros que busca la felicidad. La felicidad es posible, pero puede no ser fácil buscarla, encontrarla o mantenerla. Ser feliz es una decisión, una elección al enfrentar las realidades de la vida. Dios hace el trabajo más pesado; como cristianos, descubrimos esto en y por medio de nuestra fe en Jesucristo. Las personas de sabiduría y de fe son nuestras compañeras en el camino, y Dios puede invitarnos a ser también ese compañero para otra persona.

A través del lente de la fe, iluminados por la esperanza y el amor, fortalecidos por nuestra comunidad de fe y por nuestra propia vida personal de oración, podemos encontrar maneras de vivir y celebrar los desafíos de cada día como bendiciones, y dar gracias con prontitud por las gracias del día, sabiendo que Dios está con nosotros en todo el camino.

Sofonías es uno de los profetas menos conocidos del Antiguo Testamento. Hoy habla en la primera lectura sobre el juicio inminente. Pero el Señor dejará un “resto” en Israel. Esta imagen de un resto, de lo que quedará, será vital para judíos y cristianos. La carta de Pablo a los corintios evidencia su profunda preocupación por los cristianos de allí. Están muy confiados, dice, muy seguros de sí mismos. Los insta a recordar que Cristo les ha dado todo lo que tienen. El Evangelio de hoy incluye el comienzo del “Gran Sermón” de Jesús. Así como Dios le dio a Moisés la Ley en el Sinaí, ahora Jesús reúne a sus discípulos en un monte para enseñarles la nueva Ley. Cada una de estas Bienaventuranzas contrasta la humillación del presente con la gloria del futuro. La pobreza frente a las riquezas del Reino de Dios, el hambre de Dios frente a la satisfacción en el Espíritu, la persecución frente al Reino de Dios. Jesús aquí está hablando al “resto” elegido de Dios.

How to be Happy!

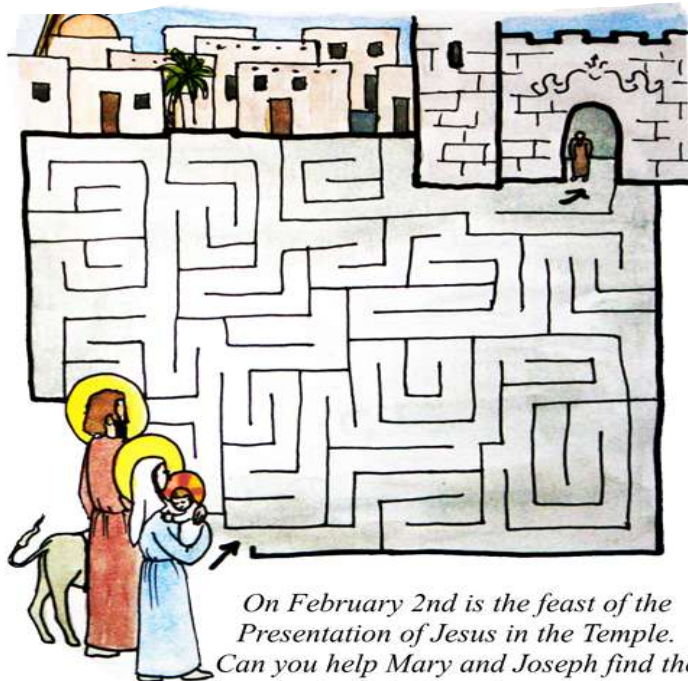
In today's Gospel Jesus teaches the eight beatitudes. Beatitude means happiness.

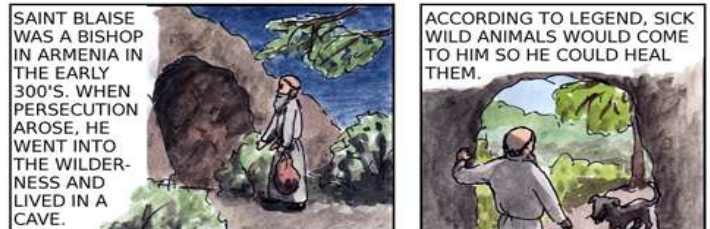

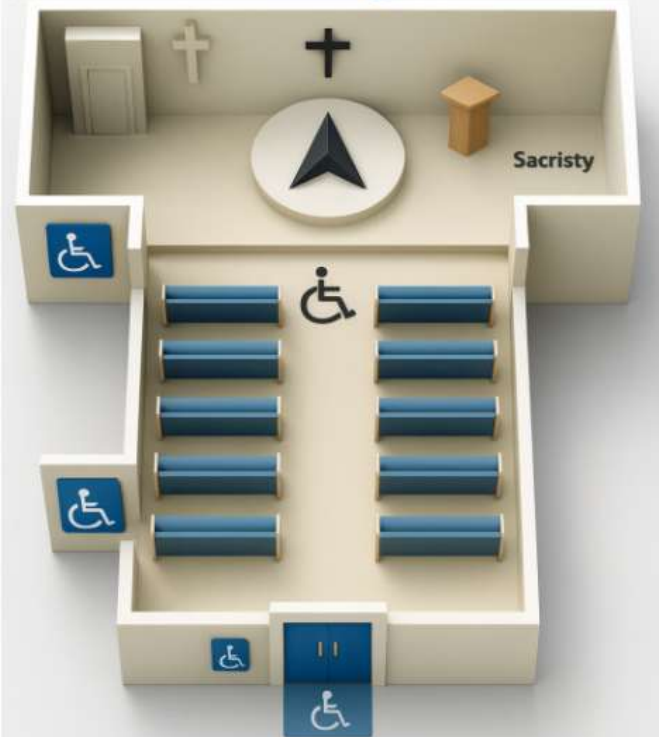

THE CHOSEN REMNANT

Zephaniah is one of the least-known of the Old Testament prophets. He speaks in today's first reading of impending judgment. But the Lord will leave a "remnant" in Israel. This image of a remnant, or remainder, was to become vital to both Judaism and Christianity. Paul's letter to Corinth makes obvious his deep concern for the Christians there. They are too self-confident, he says, too sure of themselves. He admonishes them to remember that Christ has given them all they have. Today's Gospel comprises the opening of Jesus' "Great Sermon." As God gave Moses the law on Sinai, so now Jesus gathers his disciples on a hillside to teach them the new law. Each of these Beatitudes contrasts the humiliation of the present with the glory of the future: poverty vs. the riches of God's kingdom, hunger for holiness vs. fulfillment in the Spirit, persecution vs. the reign of God. Jesus is here speaking to God's chosen "remnant." - Arch 16 JSP
