

Pope Leo XIV last Thursday appointed astronomer Father Richard Anthony D'Souza, SJ, as the new director of the Vatican



Observatory. D'Souza, who has worked at the Vatican's astronomical research and educational institution since 2016, will start his new position on Sept. 19, according to the Holy See Press Office statement. The Indian priest succeeds Brother Guy J. Consolmagno, SJ, whose 10year mandate ends next month, as head of the observatory. Consolmagno will remain at the scientific institution as a staff astronomer.

The Church's first observatory was founded in 1579 by Pope Gregory XIII, who entrusted the institution to the Society of Jesus.

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY



August 3, 2025
18th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:
CARING FOR WHAT MATTERS

This Sunday's readings and Psalm connect beautifully to the central theme that

is highlighted in the Gospel: What is the most important thing/ person/choice in your life?

In the spirit of Qoheleth, from the first reading, we ask ourselves, what is the meaning of it all – our hard work, our concerns and worries, the time we spent trying to get ahead? The counterpoint and response to the question is in the parable of Jesus in the Gospel from Luke: we are to work for what is of higher, deeper and more lasting value – that which matters to God.

Our catechetical sources had used this parable to teach us about the 10th commandment - "You shall not covet your neighbor's goods". Yet, there is a deeper, profound meaning. We have come to recognize that this is not just about "things" – it is also about the priorities we choose, the choices we make. The Fathers of the Church saw property more in the context of stewardship in service of God and Christian love and care for fellow human beings. The social encyclicals of our popes, the guidance from the US Conference of Bishops and the Catechism of the Catholic Church affirm this understanding: the purpose of our actions and our choices needs to be seen in the light of Gospel values. Pope Francis reminded us in several documents and the Synod on Amazonia that we are called to care for the earth and one another, tending to all of God's creation. Time and again, our spiritual leaders call us to awareness of the needs of others, and remind us that we are called to respond to the needs of our neighbors - the children of God everywhere.

In reflecting on today's Scriptures we understand that we work to sustain ourselves and those for whom we are responsible. We are invited to live reasonably secure and to wisely plan for the present and the future. We are to be good stewards of material things and our earth. Then we are challenged to be attentive and responsive to the needs of our community, our neighbor and all God's family.

Who and what matters to God? Remember the Good Samaritan story? How do we grow in our understanding of our call to be disciples in the world today – and live according to Gospel values? When our lives and prayers are in balance they are patterned after the teaching of Jesus: be rich in what matters to God.


BECOMING SAINTS



In about a month, on September 7, two young men will be canonized, the newest official saints to be added to our Catholic heritage of persons who have been acknowledged and celebrated for the way they expressed their faith and love during their short lives.

Pier Giorgio Frassati, born in Turin Italy in 1901, was an avid mountaineer and Third Order Dominican. He was also known for his enjoyment of sports and outdoor activities with his friends that he often organized. Along with those, he was also known for his quiet generous charity and outreach toward those in need, actions often unknown to his parents. His short life - only 24 when he died of polio - was filled with "holy living". Pope John Paul II called Pier Giorgio "a man of the beatitudes" at his beatification celebration in 1990. An example of Christian youth, he was happy, enthusiastic about everything that is good and beautiful, even as he dedicated much of his spare time caring for the poor, the homeless and sick as well as the demobilized servicemen returning from World War I. He was a daily communicant, finding in the Eucharist the strength and purpose for his life, finding Christ in all persons.

Many of us may be familiar with Blessed Carlo Acutis, born in 1991 in London, raised in Milan, and known for his great devotion to the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Carlo, an Italian computer-coding teenager, used his computer skills to draw attention to the Eucharistic miracles around the world before he died of leukemia in 2006 at 15 years of age. His "miracles exhibit" featuring more than 100 documented miracles involving the Eucharist throughout history has since traveled to thousands of parishes across five continents. His daily attendance at Mass was his strength. At age 7 he told his mother: "To always be united to Jesus. This is my life plan."

Las lecturas y el Salmo de este domingo se conectan maravillosamente con el tema central destacado en el Evangelio: ¿Cuál es la cosa, persona o elección más importante en tu vida?

En el espíritu de Qohelet, de la primera lectura, nos preguntamos: ¿Cuál es el sentido de todo esto—nuestro trabajo arduo, nuestras preocupaciones y angustias, el tiempo que dedicamos a tratar de avanzar? El contrapunto y la respuesta a esta pregunta se encuentra en la parábola de Jesús en el Evangelio según San Lucas: debemos trabajar por lo que tiene un valor más alto, más profundo y más duradero—lo que importa a Dios.

Nuestros recursos catequéticos han utilizado esta parábola para enseñarnos sobre el décimo mandamiento—"No codiciarás los bienes ajenos". Sin embargo, hay un significado más profundo y conmovedor. Hemos llegado a reconocer que no se trata solo de "cosas", sino también de las prioridades que elegimos, de las decisiones que tomamos. Los Padres de la Iglesia veían la propiedad en el contexto de la administración al servicio de Dios y del amor cristiano hacia nuestros semejantes. Las encíclicas sociales de los papas, la orientación de la Conferencia Episcopal de EE. UU. y el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica afirman esta comprensión: el propósito de nuestras acciones y decisiones debe contemplarse a la luz de los valores del Evangelio. El Papa Francisco nos lo recordó en varios documentos y en el Sínodo sobre la Amazonía: estamos llamados a cuidar la tierra y a los unos a los otros, a atender toda la creación de Dios.

Una y otra vez, nuestros líderes espirituales nos llaman a estar conscientes de las necesidades de los demás, y nos recuerdan que estamos llamados a responder a las necesidades de nuestros vecinos—los hijos de Dios en todo el mundo.

Al reflexionar sobre las Escrituras de hoy, comprendemos que trabajamos para sostenernos a nosotros mismos y a aquellos por quienes somos responsables. Se nos invita a vivir con una seguridad razonable y a planificar sabiamente para el presente y el futuro. Debemos ser buenos administradores de los bienes materiales y de la tierra. Luego se nos desafía a estar atentos y a responder a las necesidades de nuestra comunidad, nuestros vecinos y toda la familia de Dios.

¿Quién y qué importa para Dios? ¿Recuerdas la historia del Buen Samaritano? ¿Cómo podemos crecer en nuestra comprensión de nuestro llamado a ser discípulos en el mundo de hoy—y vivir conforme a los valores del Evangelio? Cuando nuestras vidas y oraciones están en equilibrio, se modelan según la enseñanza de Jesús: ser ricos en lo que importa a Dios.



Convirtiéndose en Santos

> Dentro de aproximadamente un mes, el 7 de septiembre, dos jóvenes serán canonizados: los más recientes santos oficiales añadidos a nuestra herencia católica

de personas reconocidas y celebradas por la manera en que expresaron su fe y amor durante sus cortas vidas.

Pier Giorgio Frassati, nacido en Turín, Italia, en 1901, fue un apasionado alpinista y miembro de la Tercera Orden Dominicana. También era conocido por su afición a los deportes y las actividades al aire libre con sus amigos, que solía organizar con frecuencia. Además de esto, se destacaba por su generosa caridad silenciosa y su labor con los necesitados, acciones que a menudo eran desconocidas por sus padres. Su vida breve —falleció de polio a los 24 años— estuvo llena de "vida santa". El papa Juan Pablo II lo Ilamó "un hombre de las bienaventuranzas" en su ceremonia de beatificación en 1990. Ejemplo de juventud cristiana, era alegre, entusiasta por todo lo bueno y bello, aun mientras dedicaba gran parte de su tiempo libre al cuidado de los pobres, los enfermos, los desamparados y los soldados desmovilizados tras la Primera Guerra Mundial. Comulgaba diariamente, encontrando en la Eucaristía la fuerza y el propósito de su vida, viendo a Cristo en todas las personas.

Muchos de nosotros quizás ya conozcamos al Beato Carlo Acutis, nacido en 1991 en Londres, criado en Milán, conocido por su gran devoción a la presencia real de Jesús en la Eucaristía. Carlo, un adolescente italiano con talento para la programación informática, utilizó sus habilidades para dar visibilidad a los milagros eucarísticos en todo el mundo antes de morir de leucemia en 2006, a los 15 años. Su "exposición de milagros", que presenta más de 100 milagros documentados relacionados con la Eucaristía a lo largo de la historia, ha recorrido miles de parroquias en cinco continentes. Su asistencia diaria a Misa era su fortaleza. A los 7 años le dijo a su madre: "Estar siempre unido a Jesús. Este es mi plan de vida."

Jesus teaches us not to be greedy



In today's Gospel reading, a man tells Jesus that his brother is being unfair to him. But Jesus knows that the man is just being greedy, so He tells him the

parable of the rich farmer. One year he had such a good harvest that he couldn't fit it all into his barns. He tore down his old barns and built new ones, so that he could store his food for many years. But just when he thought he would be able to rest and enjoy his food, God told him that he would die.

This parable is a warning against being greedy. Jesus is not saying that we should not save some food or that we shouldn't save our money. He is just telling us to remember that we are going to die one day, and then everything we saved is going to be useless for us. He wants us to use the things we have wisely, but not be too attached to them.

Think of something that is really special to you. How would you feel if you lost it or it was taken away? Do your feelings show that you care too much about things? Try to think of your belongings in such a way that if you lost them you wouldn't be too upset. After all, none of your stuff is going to matter to you when you die!
