



REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH

TIME: THE POWER OF THE
WORD

A central theme of today's Scriptures is the power of the Word of God. The first reading from the

Book of Nehemiah recounts a portion of the return of the Jewish people from a very long exile in Babylon. They had neglected being faithful to the Covenant with God, and, after several generations of forced absence, were finally restored to Israel. When they are gathered back in Jerusalem standing amid the ruins of their temple and hear the Word of the Law of God proclaimed, they are both grieved by their lack of fidelity and reminded that they need to celebrate God's fidelity and goodness in returning them to their homeland.

The importance of the proclamation of the Scriptures is heard in the Responsorial Psalm and in the Gospel. Both Nehemiah and the Gospel speak of proclaiming the Scriptures to the assembly and each reading lets us know that the leader is attentive to the Word of God, calling his hearers to be attentive to the Word as well.

The Gospel selection combines two parts, first Luke's explanation of how the Gospel came to be written down, then one of Luke's early stories of the "manifestation" of Jesus when he returns to Nazareth, following his baptism by John in the River Jordan and sojourn in the desert. We hear that Jesus has been preaching and has become respected by all. Luke's chapter 4 goes on to tell us that after Jesus has proclaimed the Word from the scroll, and told the people of his hometown that the scriptures are now being fulfilled, the townspeople rise up to oust Jesus from the synagogue. The risk that Jesus takes is the proclamation of the truth. Although they admired his actions, his listeners were now threatened and angered by his words.

The Word, embodied in the Bible, tells us of the love, care, power, compassion and mercy of God throughout the times of both the Hebrew Covenant and the Christian Covenant. We know that the writing of the Word has been inspired by the Holy Spirit; our hearing the Word and responding to it is also the on-going work of the Spirit in our lives today. We also learn time and again of the risk and cost of proclaiming the Truth, the Word. To speak the Truth is not always an easy mission.

Let us be courageous as we daily proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ! It is God's gift of faith that leads us to remember each day that God is with us, and that we are called to be the manifestation of God's love to all.

PRAYING WITH THE POPE




A familiar
daily prayer is called
the Morning Offering. I
learned it
from my
parents as
part of our

breakfast prayer: "O Jesus, through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I offer you my prayers, works, joys and sufferings of this day in union with the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass throughout the world. I offer them for the intentions of your Sacred Heart, for the salvation of souls, for the souls in purgatory and for the union of all Christians. I offer them for the intentions of our bishops and for all the Apostles of prayer, in particular for the intentions recommended by our Holy Father for this month." The prayer I use each morning is one of several slight variations of this prayer and at times a few additional intentions are mentioned.

Sometimes when there was a rush, our family prayer was shortened to "All for Jesus through Mary." But years later, I wondered about the intentions of the Holy Father and what those special intentions can tell us about his concerns for the world. He carries an incredibly open heart for the concerns of people all over the world and for the earth itself. Doing a bit of internet work - and reading our daily missal - I discovered the "Pope's Worldwide Prayer Network".

Each year the Prayer Network ministry makes known the 12 new intentions that the pope has chosen for the new year. During 2024 we prayed for the gifts of diversity in the Church, for the terminally ill, the new martyrs, the role of women in every culture, the formation of religious and seminarians, for migrants, pastoral care of the sick, political leaders, the cry of the earth, a shared mission, for anyone who has lost a child and for pilgrims of hope.

For 2025, we are asked to pray for the right to an education for migrants, refugees and those affected by war (January), for vocations to the priesthood and religious life (February) and the intentions for the rest of the year are available online.

VIRGEN DE SUYAPA

El día 3 de febrero, la semana que entra, se celebra entre misas, mariachis, fuegos artificiales y muchas expresiones de religiosidad popular, la fiesta de Nuestra Señora de la Concepción de Suyapa en Honduras. Fue un sábado del mes de febrero, cuando Alejandro Colindres, un joven humilde labrador, y Jorge Martínez, un niño



de ocho años, la encontraron. Según la tradición estos llegaron cansados a la quebrada del Piligüín. Acostándose sobre el suelo, Alejandro sintió lo que le parecía una piedra en su espalda. Por más que intentaba arrojarla lejos, cuando se acostaba sentía la misma piedra. Por fin en lugar de tirarla, la puso en su mochila y al amanecer descubrió que no era piedra sino una pequeña imagen de María (6.5 cm.) con rostro indígena tallada en madera. En 1780 se le construyó un templo y en 1796 se registró su primer milagro. El Papa Pió XII la proclamó Patrona de la República de Honduras en 1925. En las advocaciones latinoamericanas ella es nombrada como la fortaleza de los humildes.





El Ejercicio Real en la **PREDICACIÓN**

Muchas veces cuando vamos al dentista nos preguntan: "¿Con anestesia o sin anestesia?" A veces contestamos: "Hoy, sin anestesia". La predicación en la iglesia debe ser siempre sin anestesia. Sin anestesia se siente más la aguja y el torno, pero no estás ocho horas con las mandíbulas dormidas. Es más hermoso y práctico escuchar la Palabra con todos nuestros sentidos depsiertos. Es más eficaz un sermón que camina que un sermón que se habla. El ojo es mejor alumno que el oído y el ejemplo es más claro que el consejo. Ambos son necesarios: el sermón que camina y el sermón que se habla, el sermón que nos entra por los ojos y el que nos entra por los oídos. Esta es la historia de Jesús de Nazaret. San Lucas, 4, 14-21, nos dice que Jesús volvió a su pueblo, Nazaret. Todos tenían los ojos fijos en él. Terminada la lectura dijo: "Hoy se cumplen estas profecías que acaban de escuchar". Jesús no vino a leer la Biblia. Vino a cumplirla. Jesús no vino a predicar cosas lindas. Vino a hacer cosas lindas. Jesús no vino a enseñarnos el camino del cielo. Vino a hacer con nosotros el camino hacia el cielo. Jesús no vino a predicar el infierno, vino a abrir las puertas del cielo a todos. Jesús vino a "proclamar el año de la gracia del Señor". 

The Church is a Body

The Catholic Church isn't a building. Did you know that? The Church is actually the group of people who have been baptized into the Faith. All the different kinds of people in the Church work together, just like a person's body.

Now think about the Church. It has a pope, bishops and

priests, teachers, doctors, musicians, mothers and fathers, and even children. What do each of these people do for the Church?

What is your job in the Church right now? What do you think it will be when you are grown up?

Answer to Word-Find: We are one body in Christ.

'ONE BODY' WORD-FIND







SAINT PAUL tells us that we have been BAPTIZED into the ONE body of CHRIST which is the CHURCH. There are MANY MEMBERS, but they all work TOGETHER and CARE for each other. But the parts of a BODY are not ALL the same as each other! An EYE is different from an ear, and a HAND is not the same as a FOOT. If all your body was an EAR, then how could you SMELL?

In the Church there are many different GIFTS. Some people are APOSTLES, some are PROPHETS, some are TEACHERS. Some people have the gift of HEALING. GOD has made all these different sorts of people to work together in the Church.

More about Marriage
Practices

As Roman Catholics, our marriage practices have their pedigree in ancient Rome. One of the major players in shaping our practices was the warfare involved in building an empire. Soldiers vanished and sometimes never

returned. Women began to manage their lives and to make decisions. The old family values were replaced by patriotic ones, and religion was more attuned to the gore and glory of battle, a religion of the state, not of the family. Weddings were still family celebrations, but had a public face. The bride wore a white toga and a red veil and walked to her new home. There, she and her husband joined their right hands and gave consent to each other, not relying on her father to give consent for her. Religion was optional: a pagan priest might be invited or not, and even without the ceremony, society agreed by common law that a year of living together equaled marriage consent. By the same token, marriage by consent also meant divorce was on the same legal footing, and did not require the courts or civil declarations. This is the worldview the first Christians inherited, and it was up to them to determine what was good and to hold marriage up to the light of the gospel. -Rev. James Field

We can likewise know the joys and sorrows of the other members of the Body and share in them for the strengthening of the whole Body of Christ.

Understanding the message



We can't understand the gospel from only hearing it at Mass. We must become familiar with the images, the stories, the characters, the overall arch of the story of Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection, to enter more fully into the Mass. The Real Presence of Jesus in the Mass is in

the gospel proclamation, in the elements of bread and wine which becomes his Body and Blood, and in the lives of the baptized people in the pews. Read the stories, open the scriptures, and enter the scene of how the characters interact. After all, we become what we celebrate at Mass; we become the Body of Christ on earth. The scriptures help us understand the person of Jesus Christ. I always use the example of the Good Shepherd. We can memorize Psalm 23. However, we need to have a relationship with the Shepherd. There is a difference in memorizing a story and fully knowing the Shepherd in our lives. We can hear the gospel, but it will make no difference until we know the person of Jesus Christ. As we begin hearing the Gospel of Luke in the opening Sundays of Ordinary Time, we also know that Luke is writing for his community that is poor. He desires to lift them up in the story of Jesus. He desires healing for their lives. In this context, the opening scene of Luke's Gospel is so important. We too, come to Mass not just for our own benefit, but to pray for the world, the poor, the prisoner, the hungry, those whose lives are the result of unjust systems. We should all take to heart the closing line of today's gospel, "Today, this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."
