

Pope says true charity lovingly offers help, expects nothing in return

VATICAN CITY (CNS) — True Christian charity respects the person being assisted and sets no conditions for receiving help, Pope Leo XIV said. Charity involves both selfless giving and respect for human dignity of the other person, the pope said Sept. 1 as he met people involved in the Capuchin-sponsored Opera San Francesco for the Poor. "We care for those we meet simply for their own good, so that they may grow to their full potential and follow their own path, without expecting anything in return and without imposing conditions," the pope told the group from Milan. That way of acting is precisely what "God does with each of us," he said, "showing us the way, offering us all the help we need to follow it, but then leaving us free."

DUBLIN (OSV News) — Bishop Paul Tighe, a top official at the Vatican's Dicastery for Culture and Education, is urging caution on artificial intelligence — warning that its hidden environmental costs, impact on jobs and broader social risks can't be overlooked. Speaking at a European theology congress in Dublin Aug. 23, Bishop Tighe, who is the secretary of the dicastery, highlighted AI isn't the silver bullet — it comes with a price, starting with the environment. Bishop Tighe highlighted more attention needs to be paid to the "actual environmental cost of AI" as he warned against "techno optimism" promoting AI as the means of tackling the environmental crisis.

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

Luke's Gospel has been building with

images and parables of what the followers of Jesus are called to do. It emphasizes the continuous and ever-deepening nature of faithful discipleship. We are asked to concentrate on getting our priorities in order if we are to be true followers of The Way. "Hating your father and mother, spouse or children" is, in Hebrew imagery, a matter of determining what you might love more than your family. If we love Jesus, and are determined to follow him, not only does discipleship become *THE* priority in our life, but we are now confronted with the cross – not simply accepting it, but carrying it, not giving in to the cost.

Aren't there times and situations when we would just like God to give us a clear signal about what we are doing, if we're on the right path, or what would be the best decisions to make?!! We might ask ourselves if the daily work we are doing is truly pleasing to God and helping make the world a better place. At times we wonder if we are using our Godgiven talents and abilities to the best possible use. Sometimes we just want things to stay as they are in a comfortable routine that seems to help our lives run along smoothly and not require too much effort or change from us.

Sometimes God intervenes through human and circumstantial means – like when losing a job or being cut back on hours give us an opportunity to re-examine how we prioritize our time and energy. Or when new responsibilities at home or work or a promotion make us stretch ourselves and discover our abilities to do things or be something we hadn't thought of before, or develop skills we didn't quite realize we had. That may be grace – even in disguise.

Even when things are going along smoothly, there is the challenge we have been given through our call to disciple-ship: to live in such a way that our very lives are a sort of "Gospel" we are writing each day – who God is for us, what the Gospel message means to us, and how we understand the Good News of God's love and mercy in our lives. This is our Baptismal call – God welcomed us into the Family of Faith, and gave us both the grace and the community of believers to help us along the way. We each are called to work for a deeper and more vital relationship with God in Jesus Christ, which we live out in our daily lives in family, work-place and community.

SAYING AMEN



Often our prayers become so familiar we don't really think about what we are saying, and our responses to the prayer dialogues at Mass

become almost routine. It might be possible to take a few moments for a refreshing "retreat" with time to think about what we say in the words we pray.

Stepping back from our habitual saying of "Amen" gives us a chance to look more deeply into the meaning of this simple word, which has layers and history of meaning. Derived from the Hebrew "amen" which means certainty, truth, and verify, the word is found is the Hebrew Bible, and in both the Old and New Testament. Think of it as also meaning fixed, sure or firm, to be reliable, and to be trusted. In the Gospels, Jesus uses the term to announce a special truth or teaching, something he wants his disciples to really pay attention to, and he is verifying that what he says is trustworthy and firm. He is the only person who uses the term and he speaks it at the beginning of his own statements rather than in response to what someone else says. Translated at times as "truly, truly" or "verily", Jesus speaks to Nathanael, Nico-demus, the crowds in Galilee after the miracle of the multiplication of loaves, and to his disciples at several other significant times.

As I read an article by Father Felix Just, S.J. about the Amen sayings of Jesus, I realized how little I had thought about that before. We use AMEN to close our prayer or at times to voice our support for what another has spoken. Each time we say AMEN we need to remember what we are giving our affirmation to. The truth may be challenging us! It may be that we need to learn to pause in our prayer, to listen, to await the word and inspiration of God before we say Amen. Then we can say it and mean it. Amen!

ALINEANDO LAS PRIORIDADES



7 de Septiembre XXIII Tiempo Ordinario

El Evangelio de Lucas se ha ido construyendo con imágenes y parábolas sobre lo que se espera de los seguidores de Jesús. Enfatiza la naturaleza continua y cada vez más profunda del discipulado fiel. Se nos pide que nos concentremos en ordenar nuestras prioridades si queremos ser verdaderos seguidores del Camino. "Odiar a tu padre y madre, cónyuge o hijos" es, en la imaginería hebrea, una manera de expresar qué podrías amar más que a tu familia. Si amamos a Jesús y estamos decididos a seguirlo, el discipulado no solo se convierte en LA prioridad de nuestra vida, sino que también nos enfrentamos a la cruz — no simplemente aceptándola, sino cargándola, sin rendirnos ante el costo.

¿No hay momentos y situaciones en los que desearíamos que Dios nos diera una señal clara sobre lo que estamos haciendo, si estamos en el camino correcto, o cuáles serían las mejores decisiones que podríamos tomar? Podemos preguntarnos si el trabajo diario que realizamos realmente agrada a Dios y contribuye a hacer del mundo un lugar mejor. A veces nos cuestionamos si estamos utilizando nuestros talentos y habilidades dadas por Dios de la mejor manera posible. En ocasiones, simplemente deseamos que las cosas permanezcan como están, en una rutina cómoda que parece ayudar a que nuestra vida fluya sin mayores esfuerzos ni cambios.

A veces Dios interviene a través de medios humanos y circunstanciales — como cuando perdemos un empleo o se reducen nuestras horas laborales, lo cual nos da la oportunidad de reexaminar cómo priorizamos nuestro tiempo y energía. O cuando nuevas responsabilidades en casa o en el trabajo, o una promoción, nos obligan a esforzarnos más y descubrir habilidades que no sabíamos que teníamos, o desarrollar capacidades que no habíamos reconocido. Eso puede ser gracia — incluso disfrazada.

Incluso cuando todo parece ir bien, existe el desafío que se nos ha dado a través de nuestro llamado al discipulado: vivir de tal manera que nuestras propias vidas sean una especie de "Evangelio" que escribimos cada día — quién es Dios para nosotros, qué significa el mensaje del Evangelio, y cómo entendemos la Buena Nueva del amor y la misericordia de Dios en nuestras vidas. Este es nuestro llamado bautismal — Dios nos dio la bienvenida a la Familia de la Fe, y nos otorgó tanto la gracia como la comunidad de creyentes para acompañarnos en el camino. Cada uno de nosotros está llamado a trabajar por una relación más profunda y vital con Dios en Jesucristo, la cual vivimos en nuestra vida diaria, en la familia, el trabajo y la comunidad.

Recuerda: después de la noche más oscura, el sol brilla más fuerte. Así es la esperanza que Dios nos ofrece.



La Buena Nueva es que todos estamos invitados al Reino de Dios y a ser sus discípulos. Esta invitación transforma nuestra vida y exige discernimiento profundo. Al elegir caminos como el Matrimonio, el Orden sagrado o la vida célibe o comunitaria, debemos planificar con seriedad, considerando tanto los costos emocionales como espirituales. Como el constructor de la torre o el rey Salomón, buscamos sabiduría divina para tomar decisiones que marcarán nuestro destino, confiando en la guía de Dios aunque no siempre comprendamos todo.

Diciendo ... AMÉN

A menudo nuestras oraciones se vuelven tan familiares que no pensamos realmente en lo que estamos diciendo, y nuestras respuestas a los diálogos de oración en la Misa se vuelven casi rutinarias. Tal vez sea posible tomar unos



momentos para un "retiro" refrescante, con tiempo para reflexionar sobre las palabras que decimos al orar. Alejarnos un poco del hábito de decir "Amén" nos da la oportunidad de profundizar en el significado de esta palabra sencilla, que tiene capas e historia. Derivada del hebreo "āmēn", que significa certeza, verdad y verificación, esta palabra se encuentra en la Biblia hebrea y en ambos Testamentos, el Antiguo y el Nuevo. También puede entenderse como algo fijo, seguro o firme; como ser confiable y digno de confianza.

En los Evangelios, Jesús usa el término para anunciar una verdad o enseñanza especial, algo a lo que quiere que sus discípulos presten verdadera atención, y está verificando que lo que dice es digno de confianza y firme. Él es la única persona que usa el término al comienzo de sus propias declaraciones, en lugar de como respuesta a lo que otro ha dicho. Traducido a veces como "en verdad, en verdad" o "de cierto", Jesús lo pronuncia al dirigirse a Natanael, a Nicodemo, a las multitudes en Galilea después del milagro de la multiplicación de los panes, y a sus discípulos en varios otros momentos significativos.

Al leer un artículo del Padre Felix Just, S.J. sobre las expresiones de Amén en boca de Jesús, me di cuenta de lo poco que había pensado en ello antes. Usamos AMÉN para cerrar nuestras oraciones o, en ocasiones, para expresar nuestro apoyo a lo que otro ha dicho. Cada vez que decimos AMÉN, debemos recordar a qué estamos dando nuestra afirmación. ¡La verdad puede estar desafiándonos! Tal vez necesitemos aprender a hacer una pausa en nuestra oración, a escuchar, a esperar la palabra y la inspiración de Dios antes de decir Amén. Entonces podremos decirlo... y sentirlo de verdad. ¡Amén!

In today's Gospel reading Jesus says, "If any one comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even


his own life, he cannot be my disciple."

Answer to Word-Find: We ask God for His mercy.








in the past generation, as certain prescribed Church rules and regulations have been reduced and relaxed. These rules were often referred to as "disciplines." We are mistaken, however, to think that it no longer takes discipline to follow Christ. The Letter to the Hebrews assures us of that today. Our discipline is more like that of an athlete pursuing a victory or a personal best, or a musician striving for a concert career or to master a new piece of music. This discipline comes from desire, not from regulations. It was the desire to do the will of God that led Jesus on the path to his cross. It is that same desire he encourages in us today: to strive to enter through the narrow gate, to find ourselves in the kingdom with a surprising assortment of people who are there not because of mere observation of rules, but out of a genuine desire to recline at the table of the heavenly banquet.

INVITED

The Good News is that we have all been invited-invited to the Kingdom, invited to be disciples. It's a life-changing invitation, and like so many other such invitations, it requires a great deal of deliberation and discernment. Whether we choose marriage, ordination, single life, or community life, we know the serious planning and consideration that accompany these profound decisions. Like the tower-builder in the Gospel, we have weighed both the monetary and emotional cost. We have pondered and planned our lives in the direction to which we believe God has called us. And while we pray for guidance and acceptance of God's will, we often fail to understand so much. Like Solomon, we turn to God for wisdom and counsel in our life-changing decisions.


