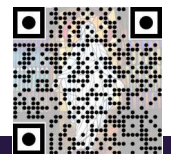

Presbyters

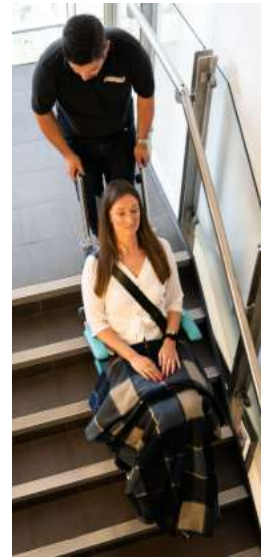
By the year 1000, the role of presbyters had evolved from being advisers to bishops into what we now recognize as ordained priests, influenced in part by Germanic traditions that emphasized personal intent. The celebration of Mass became central, marked by specific rituals such as anointing the priest's hands and presenting sacred vessels. This signaled a shift from a collaborative presbytery to a distinct priestly identity centered on Eucharistic responsibilities—particularly as the chalice had become exclusive to clergy. Priests no longer held collective influence over bishops and instead served as either parish pastors connected to local communities or monastic priests focused on offering Mass for spiritual intentions.

TIME: IMAGING FAITH AND
GOD

This is a Sunday whose Scriptures give us food for thought for many days! It holds one of the best-known Gospel stories – “The Good Samaritan” – in a context that challenges and

forms our ways of thinking about our “neighbor”. Simple is not always easy, nor is being the kind of person we are challenged to be according to the Scriptures today. The first reading from Deuteronomy begins as a continuation of the sentence in the Bible which begins: “The Lord will delight in you and your descendants ‘if only you would heed the voice of the Lord your God...and return to the Lord...’” Then the reading goes on to remind the people that the Law of God is already in their hearts – a testimony to us that God dwelling within us gives us the spirit of love and compassion. That message is clearly told in the Gospel

Between those readings, we have the selection from Paul's letter to the Colossians, which is a poetic and teaching hymn about the centrality of Christ Jesus in the unfolding of all creation and salvation. This reading – and its larger section of Paul's letter – gives us so much to think about in our prayer time. This Christ Jesus, Son of God, became one of us humans to help us know how to live out the law of God that is already in our hearts. How awesome! How blessed we are!

So we find in the Gospel reading not only a restatement of the heart of the Law of God: “Love God, Love your neighbor.” An illustration of that, the parable of the Good Samaritan is an apt and profound demonstration of what it means to live out that Law. Jesus does not mince words or soften his message. We each are called to think about who is our “neighbor” in the sense of the Scriptures, then to choose and act in the manner of the compassionate and generous Samaritan.

Our society tends to want us to think differently, to isolate those not like us, to put down or dismiss those in need. That is not the law of the family of God. We are called to be compassionate, service-minded, generous and counter-cultural. Who is your neighbor? And “Welcome to the family of God!”

Take time this week to read slowly and reflect on the entire Chapter 10 of Luke's Gospel. Those who do the work of the Lord are abundantly blessed!

THE PRAYERS OF THE FAITHFUL



There is a true sense of the universality of the Church that reawakens us at each liturgy. The prayers of the Mass continually link us to the past and express our hope and intent for the future. Our Church year celebrates saints from throughout the world

and from ages gone by. Especially in the past few months our country has renewed its link with the Vatican as we celebrate and pray at each liturgy for Pope Leo XIV, born and raised in Chicago! The entire Eucharistic liturgy re-enacts for us the sacrifice of Jesus Christ offered for the redemption of all humankind. We are reminded through prayer, that we are all children of one God, sisters and brothers to God's children everywhere and have a mission to care for the concerns of the world.

In particular at each liturgy, following the Profession of Faith, the Creed, there is a set of prayers often called the Prayers of the Faithful. These Universal Prayers pour out our petitions for the needs of the whole Church and for the salvation of the whole world. (GIRM # 55). These prayers, offered at each liturgy, are our communal response to the Word we have heard and received in faith. They are our opportunity to exercise our baptismal priesthood as we pray, in concrete detail, **for the Church, for those who govern and shepherd us in the Church, for our civic leaders in our own country and leaders around the world, for those who are burdened by any kind of difficulty and for our local community.** The unique gift of the Church is that here is our opportunity to pray specifically for the needs, hungers and hopes of our human family. Special celebrations, baptisms, first communions, confirmations, marriages, funerals, ordinations, offer times to pray together for those involved.

When we consider our prayers as our response to God's Word, God's mercy, blessing, and care for us, we unite ourselves not only to this local Church “here and now” but also as part of the larger Church. We are indeed part of the universal Church. Let us pray.. Amen.

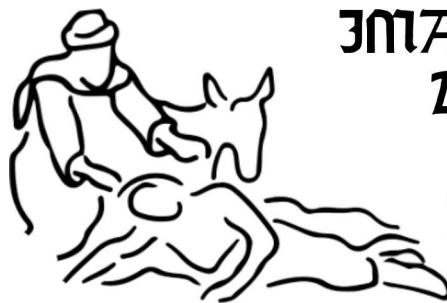


IMAGEN DE FE Y DE DIOS

LAS ORACIONES DE LOS FIELES



Hay un verdadero sentido de la universalidad de la Iglesia que nos despierta en cada liturgia. Las oraciones de la Misa nos vinculan constantemente con el pasado y expresan nuestra esperanza e intención para el futuro. El año litúrgico celebra santos de todo el mundo y de épocas ya pasadas. En especial, en los últimos meses, nuestro país ha renovado su vínculo con el Vaticano mientras celebramos y oramos en cada liturgia por el Papa León XIV, ¡nacido y criado en Chicago! Toda la liturgia eucarística reconstituye para nosotros el sacrificio de Jesucristo ofrecido para la redención de toda la humanidad. A través de la oración, se nos recuerda que somos hijos de un solo Dios, hermanas y hermanos de todos los hijos de Dios, y que tenemos una misión de cuidar las preocupaciones del mundo.

En particular, en cada liturgia, después de la Profesión de Fe, el Credo, se presenta un conjunto de oraciones que suelen llamarse las Oraciones de los Fieles. Estas Oraciones Universales derraman nuestras peticiones por las necesidades de toda la Iglesia y por la salvación de todo el mundo (IGMR n.º 55). Estas oraciones, ofrecidas en cada liturgia, son nuestra respuesta comunitaria a la Palabra que hemos escuchado y recibido con fe. Son nuestra oportunidad para ejercer nuestro sacerdocio bautismal al orar, en detalle concreto, por la Iglesia, por quienes nos gobiernan y nos pastorean en la Iglesia, por nuestros líderes civiles en nuestro país y en el mundo, por quienes están agobiados por cualquier tipo de dificultad y por nuestra comunidad local. El don único de la Iglesia es que aquí encontramos la oportunidad de orar específicamente por las necesidades, hambres y esperanzas de nuestra familia humana. Las celebraciones especiales —bautismos, primeras comuniones, confirmaciones, matrimonios, funerales, ordenaciones— ofrecen momentos para orar juntos por quienes están involucrados.

Cuando consideramos nuestras oraciones como respuesta a la Palabra de Dios, a su misericordia, bendición y cuidado por nosotros, nos unimos no solo a esta Iglesia local “aquí y ahora”, sino también como parte de la Iglesia más amplia. De hecho, somos parte de la Iglesia universal.

Oremos... Amén.

Este es un domingo cuyas Escrituras nos ofrecen alimento espiritual para muchos días. Contiene uno de los relatos más conocidos del Evangelio: “El Buen Samaritano”, presentado en un contexto que cuestiona y forma nuestra manera de pensar sobre el “prójimo”. Ser sencillo no siempre significa ser fácil, y tampoco es fácil ser el tipo de persona a la que las Escrituras de hoy nos desafían a convertirnos.

La primera lectura del Deuteronomio comienza como continuación de la frase bíblica que dice: “El Señor se complacerá en ti y en tus descendientes, ‘si tan solo escuchas la voz del Señor tu Dios... y regresas al Señor...’”. Luego, la lectura continúa recordando al pueblo que la Ley de Dios ya está en sus corazones: testimonio para nosotros de que Dios, al habitar dentro de nosotros, nos da el espíritu de amor y compasión. Ese mensaje se transmite claramente en el Evangelio.

Entre estas lecturas, tenemos el pasaje de la carta de Pablo a los colosenses, que es un himno poético y doctrinal sobre la centralidad de Cristo Jesús en el desarrollo de toda la creación y la salvación. Esta lectura —y el resto de la carta— nos ofrece mucho en qué pensar durante nuestro tiempo de oración. Este Cristo Jesús, Hijo de Dios, se hizo uno de nosotros para ayudarnos a comprender cómo vivir la ley de Dios que ya está en nuestros corazones. ¡Qué maravilloso! ¡Qué bendición tan grande!

Así vemos en la lectura del Evangelio no solo una reafirmación del núcleo de la Ley de Dios: “Ama a Dios, ama a tu prójimo”. Como ejemplo de ello, la parábola del Buen Samaritano es una ilustración profunda y apropiada de lo que significa vivir esa Ley. Jesús no edulcora su mensaje ni lo suaviza. Cada uno de nosotros está llamado a pensar quién es nuestro “prójimo” según las Escrituras, y luego a elegir y actuar como el Samaritano compasivo y generoso.

Nuestra sociedad a menudo nos anima a pensar de forma diferente, a aislar a quienes no se parecen a nosotros, a despreciar o ignorar a quienes necesitan ayuda. Esa no es la ley de la familia de Dios. Estamos llamados a ser compasivos, generosos, serviciales y contraculturales. ¿Quién es tu prójimo? Y ¡Bienvenido a la familia de Dios! Tómate tiempo esta semana para leer con calma y reflexionar sobre todo el capítulo 10 del Evangelio según san Lucas. ¡Los que hacen la obra del Señor son bendecidos en abundancia!

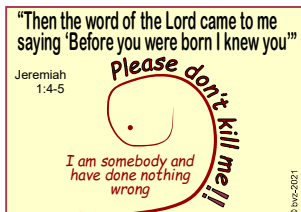
