

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

February 18 2024 FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT: GETTING READY © Clare Colella

One way I remember the season of Lent growing up in the Midwest as we moved during Lent from Winter into Spring was the renewal of nature seemed to parallel the new hope and renewal within us as well. Focusing on the beginning of Lent and the words and spirit of Ash Wednesday are a challenge to remember that this is a time of spiritual introspection, of paying close attention to the Scriptures and prayers of Lent. We are preparing during Lent for participating in the Paschal Mystery!

One of the central themes of Lent comes in this Sunday' readings: each year the Church opens Lent with the story of the temptations of Jesus from the primary Gospel of the year. This year our first reading is the wonderful story of God's visible sign of God's covenant with Noah after the flood waters have subsided. Water – the primary baptismal symbol – is woven into the covenantal relationship between God and God's people. Think of the role of water in salvation history from the creation story through the Exodus to the Baptism of Jesus and to our own baptism!

The Responsorial Psalm is a direct response and affirmation of the theme of the first reading: God's promise to Noah is celebrated as the Lord's love and truth to those who keep faithful to the Covenant.

The Second reading from the letter of St. Peter may be pivotal for us as we consider the weeks ahead as the special preparation for Initiation. We hear the link between Noah and baptism, and between baptism and redemption through the resurrection of Jesus Christ:

It is significant that each Lent the Church gives us a Gospel reading that speaks to us of a human aspect of Jesus, that he was tempted by Satan for his forty days in the desert. Mark's story of the temptations is definitely the shortest of the synoptic Gospel stories and looks immediately to Jesus beginning his mission. The other two synoptic Gospels tell us how Jesus faced and overcame temptations by his will power, the help of his knowledge of the Scriptures and his desire to be faithful to God. Each time we also hear how he resisted temptation, blessed by grace and strength: "angels ministered to him." We know that we also are strengthened by grace and faith.

Those preparing for initiation and all of us begin this season by reflecting not only on the teachings of the Church but more powerfully, on our relationship with God, attentive to the many ways we continue to grow in prayer, faithfulness and discipleship. We find that others continue to be support and strength for us, to help us choose the path of faithfulness, helping us make or renew our baptismal promises at the upcoming Easter celebrations. The challenge of Lent is to change those things that keep us from God and to strength those things in our lives that help us to be faithful.

THE MYSTERY OF FAITH



In the moment after the Consecration, the celebrant at Mass gives us an invitation with the words "The Mystery of Faith" – it is our turn to proclaim our faith in that great mystery of transubstantiation. While this phrase was used as early as the third century AD in a treatise on Baptism, the placement of the words here invites our statement of belief. The Church tells us, in and through its prayer, that the liturgy, especially the Mass, is the action of Christ the Priest and of his Body which is the Church. Our baptismal priesthood - not to be confused with the ordained priesthood – gives us profound implications for our participation in the lituray. This is our belief, this is our share.

This is also why the Church invites those who are yet to be baptized through the process of Christian Initiation to be dismissed from the sacred liturgy after the homily, since they are not yet part of the baptized community of faith. Our baptism is a sacred entry into these mysteries of faith.

During the Eucharistic Prayer not only does Jesus Christ become present, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, but Christ's saving action, his Passion, Death and Resurrection are once again enacted and are offered to the Father by Christ himself through his Priest and by all believers present. The action of Christ brought about our redemption. There are three options for the acclamation which sum up the essence of our faith: we proclaim the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ as our redemption and believe He will come again.


PERSONA DE LA ALIANZA

EL CALENDARIO GREGORIANO

El calendario que usas para trabajar, estudiar, socializar, etc., tiene apenas 439 años desde que entró en vigor. Antes que se implementara el uso del calendario que conocemos, la mayoría del mundo utilizó el calendario juliano, introducido por el emperador romano Julio César en el año 46 a.C. Esto significa que el calendario anterior se usó durante 1,628 años. El calendario juliano es solar con una duración de 365.25 días mismo que asumió un año bisiesto cada 4 años para compensar el desbalance de 6 horas anuales o 24 horas cuatrienales (1 día). El problema de esta fórmula de medición cronológica es que en términos reales, el año dura aproximadamente 11 minutos menos, lo que significa que a través de los siglos, estos 11 minutos de error se fueron acumulando hasta que llegaron a desfasarse casi 12 días; por ejemplo, si yo hubiera nacido el 10 de junio de 1579 del calendario juliano, mi fecha de nacimiento del calendario moderno marcaría el 21 de junio de 1579 ¿Suena confuso? En realidad sí, un poco; pero, veamos cómo fue que se implementó el cambio de calendarios.

Antes de la implementación del calendario moderno, el magisterio de la Iglesia ya había estado observando esta disparidad de días, misma que estaba desajustando las fechas propias de la celebración de la Pascua, que de acuerdo con el Concilio de Nicea del año 325 d.C. debe celebrarse el primer domingo después de la luna llena y posterior al equinoccio de primavera. Esto significa que el calendario juliano estaba atrasando más y más la fecha de celebración Pascual. Fue entonces que el 24 de febrero de 1582, el entonces Papa, Gregorio XIII, emitió una bula papal llamada "Inter Gravissimas", a través de la cual, los días que estaban desfazados fueron ajustados de tal manera que los días del 5 al 14 de octubre de 1582 no existieron, ya que fueron completamente borrados del calendario; es decir, el día inmediato que siguió al 4 de octubre fue el 15 de octubre en ese año. Por otro lado, los años bisiestos ahora habrían de observarse en los años cuyo número es divisible entre 4, lo que aumenta un día cada 4 años. Los años divisibles entre 100 no serían bisiestos, lo que resta 1 día a cada 100 años, a menos que sean divisibles entre 400, lo que suma un día extra cada 400 años. Esta sigue siendo la formulación cronológica que usamos en la modernidad de nuestros tiempos. A este calendario le llamamos, "EL CALENDARIO GREGORIANO".

En resumen, mientras que la gran mayoría del mundo ha adoptado este sistema de calendario por su gran exactitud (solo un error de 24 horas perdidas cada 3,300 años), gracias a este sistema, las celebraciones católicas ahora llevan una paridad nominal con las estaciones del año (primavera, verano, otoño e invierno), con el equinoccio y el solsticio, fundamentales para proseguir dando culto a Dios propiamente en la tradición de nuestra fe. Este hermanos v hermanas, es solo uno de los grandes legados que la Iglesia Católica ha aportado al mundo. - Arch 18 enhist 2021





Have you given up on "Giving Up"?



By the First Sunday of Lent, many people have given up on "giving up." Yet experiencing hunger for favorite things is a sign of a desire to face our deepest hungers. We do not embrace fasting as individuals, but rather as the community's way of life in this season. Sometimes it helps to see Sunday as an oasis in the Lenten desert, a place where fasting is not as strictly observed. If we count the days of the Lenten calendar, starting backward from the end of Lent on Holy Thursday, it is difficult to measure the forty days. Many are surprised to learn that the Sundays are counted as part of Lent, but are not counted in tallying the forty days of the Lenten fast. For that, we count the fast backward into last week, beginning on Ash Wednesday. So, until today we have been in the Lenten fast, days that function as a kind of overture to a symphony of conversion. Today Lent solemnly begins, marked in many places by the sending of catechumens and candidates to the bishop for the call to the Easter sacraments. Tomorrow with them, we embrace the Lenten fast again. Today we are exactly forty days from the opening of the Paschal Triduum on Holy Thursday.

Seasonal Changes for the Liturgies of Lent

Today is the First Sunday of Lent. During this season of preparation for Easter, our churches look stark and simple-no flowers at the altar, no festive banners or decorations. And our liturgies feel different, too. The music is quiet except to accompany the singing of the assembly (where possible these days).

The Gloria, our Sunday song of rejoicing, is not heard except on solemnities, and we will not sing the Alleluia, our joyful acclamation of praise, until the Easter Vigil. "Alleluia cannot always / Be our song while here below," says an eleventh-century hymn. "Alleluia our transgressions / Make us for a while forego; / For the solemn time is coming / When our tears for sins must flow" (Alleluia dulce carmen, J. M. Neale, trans.). These changes in the liturgy will catch our attention, and make us eager for the festive outpouring of joy that will return with Easter. This year, may the stripped-away liturgies of Lent remind us to strip away what is not essential in our lives to make space for the crucified and risen One, and thus to be ready to sing "Alleluia" once again when Easter returns.

GOOD MORNING! WELCOME TO LENT!



You probably did not get that greeting from your priest today, and you probably did not expect it. Isn't Lent a time of reflection and repentance? Somber purple, no "Alleluias"? Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving; attending to one's relationship with God?

True enough; however, there are Lenten practices that have a festive air woven into these penitential elements. One example is in the Church's retrieval of ancient Lenten practices that made up the final preparation of persons elected to receive the Easter sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist. Jesus' urgent preaching in today's passage from Mark comes soon after his own baptism and reminds us that these sacraments still signal a dramatic change in a person's life: they have responded to Jesus' preaching of the kingdom and are now publicly professing themselves to be disciples of the Lord and fully initiated members of his visible church. The prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent were part of that preparation. Repentance was then, and remains today, important also for those already fully initiated; the work of repentance, of prayerfully examining our lives and making chaffgets 18h anticipation of God's reign, is an ongoing aspect of our life in Christ. - Arch 18 JSP
