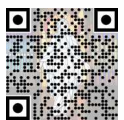

SAINT DAMIEN OF MOLOKA'I

Saint Damien of Moloka'i (born Joseph de Veuster in 1840, Belgium) was a Catholic priest who became world-renowned for his compassionate work with leprosy patients. After volunteering for mission work in Hawaii in place of his ill brother, he was ordained in 1864. In 1873, he chose to live permanently in the isolated Hawaiian government leper colony on Moloka'i, where he served as priest, doctor, caregiver, and advocate. He transformed the settlement by building houses, a church, school, and orphanage, boosted morale, and secured help from the Franciscan Sisters led by Mother Marianne Cope. Damien eventually contracted Hansen's disease himself and died in 1889 at age 49. Honored globally for showing that human compassion could ease the suffering of leprosy, he was buried in Kalaupapa, later named one of Hawaii's two statues in the U.S. Capitol, and canonized by Pope Benedict XVI in 2009.

6th SUNDAY OF EASTER:
MISSIONARY DISCIPLES

These weeks after Easter give us Scriptures that speak so boldly of the presence of Jesus with all those whom He sends into the world to continue his mission of

spreading the Good News of redemption, of God's love and mercy.

The Scriptures continue to move us toward the great feasts of the early church, the Ascension and the Pentecost event. The first reading, from Acts, tells of the power of the Holy Spirit acting in and through the apostles, Philip, Peter and John in particular. In the land of Samaria, the people, once hostile to the Jews, and who had earlier heard news of Jesus from the woman who spoke with Jesus at the well, were now ready to hear and accept the proclamation and healing of Philip. They are first baptized, then Peter and John came, laying hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit. Today's Responsorial Psalm affirms the joy that is integral to the lives of those who know, love and serve God.

The second reading, written later and attributed to Peter, assures the disciples and new followers of the Way, that in the midst of persecution, the Spirit is with them. That message is readily applicable today, for we know that in our daily life it is not easy or simple to be faithful to the Gospel teachings, to remain hope-filled, gentle and reverent in the face of adversity. We are assured that the Spirit will help show us the way and give us the strength we need.

The Gospel selection continues the farewell discourse of Jesus, progressing from believing in Jesus (last Sunday's Gospel) to loving Jesus, being the beloved of Jesus, following the two great commandments. As the disciples are promised the presence of the Holy Spirit, the Advocate, so too are we, in this day of the Church, promised the presence, power and guidance of the Holy Spirit as we make the effort to love Jesus and follow his commands. Our prayerful celebration and renewal of Baptism and Confirmation at Easter are our primary times of receiving the Spirit, and the celebration of Eucharist, every Sunday more often if possible, is our living out that call to discipleship. We are called to share that faith with others by our words and the witness of our daily lives.

LITURGY'S TRANSFORMING POWER



Mission! The third article in the USCCB's series is about being sent forth: "Go

and announce the Gospel of the Lord" is one of the formularies for the dismissal at Mass. Sometimes all we hear is "The Mass is ended" but even that short form is preceded with the words "Go forth". Pope Benedict XVI proposed that the Dismissal at Mass serves as the starting point for understanding the missionary nature of the Church (*Sacramentum caritatis* #51). I am delighted that the topic of this article coincided with the Gospel story of Philip encountering the Ethiopian, and story from Acts about the people of Samaria who become believers through the teaching of the apostles. It's one of those graced moments of awareness. Philip saw, encountered the eunuch and responded with care, time and attention.

Especially we think of the newly baptized and newly confirmed youth and adults who are now called to be witnesses and apostles continuing the mission. We recall too that we renewed our baptismal promises. Lives and hearts have been changed and renewed. The impulse, the inspiration and dedication to be missionary disciples comes from the Liturgy which has the power to transform us into people who go forth, living the Gospel-guided life and proclaim the Good News to those within, and on the margins of, society. Jesus himself gave us that example, time and again in the Gospels we hear how He reached out to those in need, who hungered for truth, for healing, for wisdom.

We are grateful for all who are in the community of faith and worship. We are also called to ask: "Who is not here? For whom are we not making space and time?" As Christ and the apostles reached beyond their "comfort zone", we are called to mission too. To whom shall we go?



No Los Dejaré Huérfanos

6to Domingo de Pascua

Mis queridísimos amigos en Cristo, Bienvenidos y ¡Feliz Día de la Madre!

Los acojo en este nuevo momento de encuentro con la Palabra de Dios que renueva la vida. En este sexto domingo, nuestro Señor promete no dejarnos nunca como huérfanos, porque enviará al Consolador, el Espíritu de la Verdad, para estar con nosotros. Este Espíritu, dice nuestro Señor, el mundo no lo acepta porque ni lo ve ni lo conoce. Hoy también celebramos en Estados Unidos a nuestras madres. Oramos por todas las madres por su amor sacrificial y su entrega para edificar las familias y nuestra gran nación. Que Dios bendiga a todas las madres e incremente su amor en ellas, para que, a su vez, difundan el amor a todos y nunca dejen a sus hijos como huérfanos en la búsqueda de vanidades terrenas.

Debemos prepararnos guardando los mandamientos

La lectura de hoy nos prepara para el don del Espíritu Santo. La promesa del Espíritu forma parte del discurso de despedida de Cristo con sus discípulos. Es una promesa de su Presencia permanente que será recibida por todos los que aman y guardan los mandamientos de Dios. «Si me aman, guardarán mis mandamientos. Y yo pediré al Padre...». Esta afirmación indica una fuerte conexión entre el amor a Dios y la recepción de su don. Mientras nos preparamos para otra celebración de Pentecostés, Jesús nos recuerda que examinemos nuestra lealtad y obediencia a sus mandamientos. El don del Abogado es un don de Dios. Recibir este don exige una disposición interior y un deseo: un corazón lleno del amor de Dios, un corazón abierto para recibir la Palabra de Dios.

Debemos prepararnos mediante la apertura a la Palabra de Dios

En la primera lectura, escuchamos sobre la apertura del pueblo de Samaria a la Palabra de Dios; escucharon a Felipe con corazones abiertos y la acogieron en su interior. Esto preparó sus corazones para recibir el Espíritu cuando Pedro y Juan les impusieron las manos. El Espíritu de Dios siempre encuentra morada en un corazón lleno del amor de Dios.

Cuando estamos llenos del amor de Dios, no nos quejamos ni siquiera cuando sufrimos por amor a Cristo. Pedro nos anima en la segunda lectura diciendo: «Porque es mejor sufrir por hacer el bien, si esa es la voluntad de Dios, que por hacer el mal». Que nuestros sufrimientos nunca provengan de hacer el mal, y que los soportemos por amor a Dios. Ese es el tipo de sufrimiento que purifica y santifica.

El amor nos dispone a recibir al Espíritu Santo

Es importante notar que el amor es un tema central en el evangelio de Juan. Jesús da un solo mandamiento: amar. Por eso, el juicio y la vida eterna comienzan ya ahora. Al final de cada día y en cada momento de cada día, para Juan solo hay una pregunta que hacerse: ¿En qué formas amé o no amé hoy? ¿He mostrado suficiente amor a mi familia y a mis vecinos? Recuerden que el mandamiento de Dios se resume en el amor a Dios y al prójimo. Vivimos en un mundo donde tanto odio ha sofocado el crecimiento del amor de Dios en nuestros corazones, haciendo difícil que el Espíritu Santo habite en

nosotros y dirija nuestras vidas. Cuando el odio, la ira, los rencores y la maldad ocupan el lugar del amor en nuestras vidas, nos convertimos en instrumentos en manos del diablo, causando más daño y dolor a los demás cuando deberíamos estar difundiendo amor. «Solo ama perfectamente al Creador quien manifiesta un amor puro por su prójimo». –San Beda el Venerable.

Jesús nos dice: «En esto conocerán todos que son mis discípulos: si se tienen amor los unos a los otros» (Jn 13,34-35). Jesús lo reitera en Juan 15,12-13: «Este es mi mandamiento: que se amen los unos a los otros como yo los he amado. Nadie tiene mayor amor que quien da la vida por sus amigos». Vemos entonces el énfasis abrumador y repetitivo sobre el amor. «Si fallamos en el amor, fallamos en todo lo demás».

Es tiempo de hacer enmiendas

Mientras nos preparamos para la venida del Espíritu, preparémonos para amar a Dios y al prójimo, y para acoger sus palabras en nuestros corazones. Si valoran el don de Dios y desean los frutos de su Espíritu, este es el momento de hacer enmiendas y preparar su corazón para acogerlo. Oramos para que Dios nos conceda un alma renovada y un corazón lleno de amor por Él.

El amor verdadero es exigente. Fallaría en mi misión si no se los dijera. El amor exige un compromiso personal con la voluntad de Dios. –San Juan Pablo II

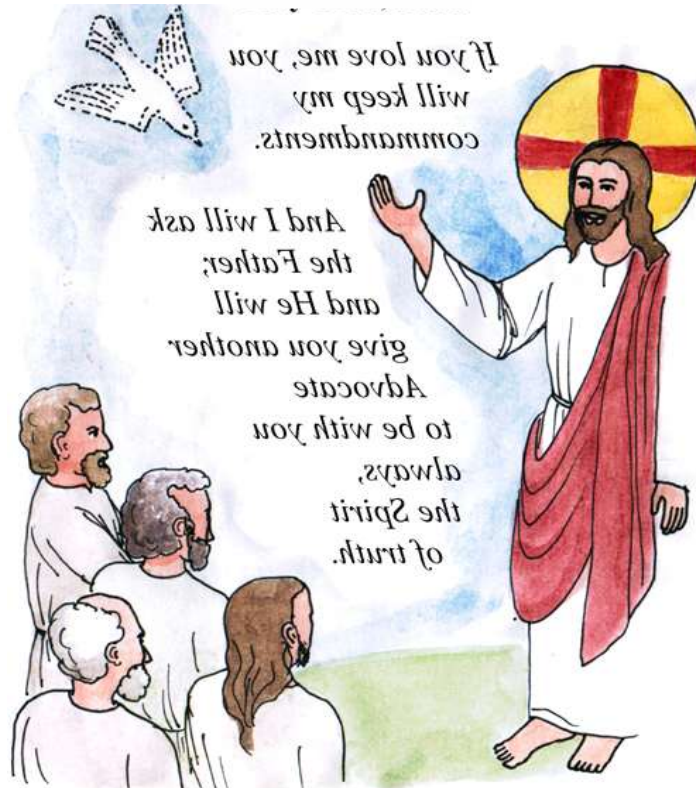

- Sacrament of the Sick

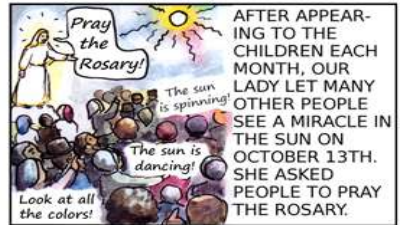
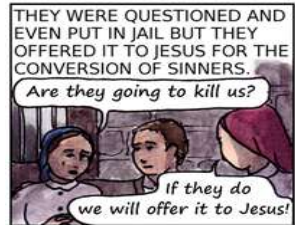
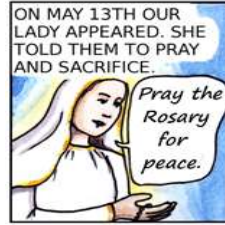

OUR LADY OF FATIMA

Between May 13 and October 13, 1917, three Portuguese children, Francisco and Jacinta Marto and their cousin Lucia dos Santos—received apparitions of Our Lady at Cova da Iria near Fatima, a city 110 miles north of

Lisbon. Mary asked the children to pray the rosary for world peace, for the end of World War I, for sinners, and for the conversion of Russia. Mary gave the children three secrets. Following the deaths of Francisco and Jacinta in 1919 and 1920 respectively, Lucia revealed the first secret in 1927. It concerned devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The second secret was a vision of hell. When Lucia grew up she became a Carmelite nun and died in 2005 at the age of 97. Pope John Paul II directed the Holy See’s Secretary of State to reveal the third secret in 2000; it spoke of a “bishop in white” who was shot by a group of soldiers who fired bullets and arrows into him. Many people linked this vision to the assassination attempt against Pope John Paul II in St. Peter’s Square on May 13, 1981. The feast of Our Lady of Fatima was approved by the local bishop in 1930; it was added to the Church’s worldwide calendar in 2002.

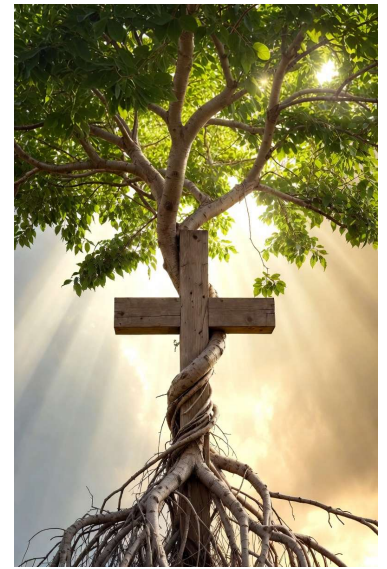
REFLECTION

The message of Fatima is simple: Pray. Unfortunately, some people—not Sister Lucia—have distorted these revelations, making them into an apocalyptic event for which they are now the only reliable interpreters. They have, for example, claimed that Mary’s request that the world be consecrated to her has been ignored. Sister Lucia agreed that Pope John Paul II’s public consecration in St. Peter’s Square on March 25, 1984, fulfilled Mary’s request. The Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith prepared a June 26, 2000, document explaining the “third secret.” Mary is perfectly honored when people generously imitate her response.

RADICAL FAITH

Being a Christian is radical. The word radical comes from the Latin radicalis, meaning “of or relating to a root.” When Christ and his teachings are our foundation, we are on a radical path, a path people have struggled to walk for more than two thousand years. Think about it: Is there anything more radical than loving God with your entire being and loving your neighbor as yourself? Society encourages us to worship money, status, prestige, and more. Putting God before any of that? Before our own spouses, parents, children, friends, all those people we love and would do anything for? And how about loving those who look different from us or who have betrayed us, injured us, or persecuted us simply because we’re told God loves them every bit as much as he loves us. Now that’s radical.

Genuflection

The custom of genuflection is not found everywhere in the Catholic Church. In fact, it is a bit of breach of etiquette to genuflect in most Eastern Catholic Churches. If you’re visiting an Eastern Catholic or an Orthodox church, the “when in Rome” rule should be adopted. Watch what the home team is doing! Usually, Eastern Catholics and Orthodox reserve a small portion of the eucharistic bread for the dying in a cupboard or eucharistic dove, but it is not a center of attention or devotion. The rule is to make a profound bow, called a “metasis,” toward the altar-bowing deeply while making the sign of the cross. East and West split years before we Westerners began to reserve the Blessed Sacrament prominently in our churches. Thus, the East never changed the original custom of bowing toward the altar. Increasingly, as tabernacles became more widespread in the West and moved into prominent placement within churches, we replaced the bow toward the altar with a genuflection toward the Blessed Sacrament when its place of reservation is visible. In a church where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in a special chapel or off the main axis of the building, normally you should bow toward the altar when you enter your pew, because the eucharistic table is the principal sign of Christ’s presence in the church building. If you have ever participated in the liturgy of Dedication of a Church and Altar, there is no mistaking the altar’s significance: it is first slathered with chrism and then adorned with a brazier billowing clouds of incense that fill the whole church as a sign of prayer and presence!
