



REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

February 25, 2024 SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT: TRUST AND TRANSFIGURATION © Clare Colella

Each of these experiences – trust and transfiguration -- reflects a theme in this Sun-

day's readings – and are part of our Lenten journey. In the Genesis story of God's difficult and strange request for Abraham – to take his only son and offer him as a sacrifice — is met with Abraham's trusting response – obedience, even in difficulty. God's blessing upon Abraham came in the form of saving Isaac and providing a ram to be sacrificed instead. We recognize that God made good on his covenant with Abraham that his descendants would be as numerous of the stars of the heaven and the sands of the seashore. Abraham's once-barren wife of Abraham is transformed into the mother of "many nations" and Abraham is the patriarch of the people of God. There is a prefiguring of the Son of God who gave his life that all peoples may be saved.

Paul's letter to the Romans speaks of that kind of trust: if God is for us, who can be against us and prevail? He also writes of the transformation of Jesus, who died and was raised and is at the right hand of the God, a position of power and authority. We are called to trust entirely in God's care for us. The generous gift of God – giving his Son to be our savior and intercessor – is a true sign of God's great love and mercy!

In Mark's Gospel, the account of the transfiguration follows a prediction of the passion and death of Jesus. While the three disciples who accompanied Jesus witnessed his glorification, they may not have understood what difficulties were ahead. We too find ourselves facing both difficulties and blessings in our lives. The Church places this Transfiguration event as the Gospel every year on the second Sunday of Lent, perhaps as a comfort to us and a reminder that as we face the challenges of taking our conversion journey seriously, we do not walk that journey alone. God is with us, and we are assured of the blessing and strength of God's grace as we continue our work of transforming ourselves into ever more faithful disciples and apostles of Jesus Christ.

This Lenten journey is our sacred and special time to deepen our relationship with our loving God, continuing to work toward our spiritual readiness to make or renew our Baptismal promises in a most meaningful way at Easter!

PRAYERFUL REMEMBERING



There is a second part of the Eucharistic Prayer that continues after the consecration and our acclamation. This could be called a "second epiclesis ("calling upon the Holy Spirit"). It is a prayerful remembering of the Mystical Body of Christ, the entire Church. Our presider at Mass calls upon the Holy Spirit to unite us with all the People of God, the saints in heaven, many of whom are named ior summarized in other Eucharistic Prayers.

Because this is our prayer of remembering our redemption, the Paschal Mystery, and the entire Mystical Body of Christ, it is also called "anamnesis". It is the holy remembering.

We, the Church, specifically praise God for our redemption, for the death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus Christ. We pray especially in remembrance of all the saints and for our Church here upon earth, naming our Holy Father and our Bishop. Our prayer continues for all the ordained and for all the living, then we pray for the faithful who have died, asking that they may receive their heavenly inheritance.

The Liturgy offers several different Eucharistic prayers, each one has a particular focus, but all have a bold remembrance of God's goodness and grace, forgiveness and mercy, and all close with the doxology - we pray that through Jesus Christ, with Him and in Him, all the unity of the Holy Spirit all glory and honor be given to God the Father, for ever and ever. The entire assembly responds with the "Great Amen", making our public affirmation of the faith just expressed.

1. Transfiguración significa "cambio de forma"

La palabra "transfiguración" proviene de las raíces latinas trans ("a través") y figura ("forma, aspecto"). Por lo tanto, significa un cambio de forma o apariencia. Esto es lo que le sucedió a Jesús en el evento conocido como la Transfiguración: su apariencia cambió y se volvió gloriosa.

2. El Evangelio de Lucas pronostica la Transfiguración

En el Evangelio de Lucas 9:27, al final de un discurso a los doce apóstoles, Jesús agrega, misteriosamente: "Pues de verdad os digo que hay algunos, entre los aquí presentes, que no gustarán la muerte hasta que vean el Reino de Dios". Esto a menudo se ha tomado como una profecía de que el fin del mundo ocurriría antes de que la primera generación de cristianos muriera. Sin embargo, la frase "reino de Dios" también puede referirse a "la expresión externa del reino invisible de Dios". El reino está encarnado en Cristo mismo y, por lo tanto, podría "verse" si Cristo lo manifestara de una manera inusual, incluso en su propia vida terrenal, así como lo fue el evento de la Transfiguración. El Papa Emérito Benedicto XVI afirmó que Jesús "argumentó convincentemente que la colocación de este dicho inmediatamente antes de la Transfiguración lo relaciona claramente con este evento". "A algunos, es decir, a los tres discípulos que acompañan a Jesús a la montaña, se les promete que presenciarán personalmente la venida del Reino de Dios 'en el poder'", agregó.

3. La Transfiguración fue presenciada por los tres discípulos principales

La Transfiguración ocurrió en presencia de los apóstoles Juan, Pedro y Santiago, los tres discípulos principales. El hecho de que Jesús solo permitió que tres de sus discípulos presenciaran el evento pudo haber provocado la discusión que rápidamente se produjo sobre cuál de los discípulos fue el más grande (Lucas 9:46).

4. El lugar donde ocurrió la Transfiguración no se conoce con exactitud

San Lucas declara que Jesús llevó a los tres a "la montaña para orar". A menudo se piensa que esta montaña es el Monte Tabor, en Israel, pero ninguno de los evangelios lo identifica con exactitud.

5. La Transfiguración sirvió para fortalecer la fe de los apóstoles

Según el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica: "La Transfiguración de Cristo tiene por finalidad fortalecer la fe de los apóstoles ante la proximidad de la Pasión: la subida a un 'monte alto' prepara la subida al Calvario. Cristo, Cabeza de la Iglesia, manifiesta lo que su cuerpo contiene e irradia en los sacramentos: 'La esperanza de la gloria'".

6. El Evangelio de Lucas es el que da más detalles de este evento

San Lucas menciona varios detalles sobre la Transfiguración que otros evangelistas no hacen. Por ejemplo, anota que esto sucedió mientras Jesús estaba orando; menciona que Pedro y sus compañeros "estaban dormidos y cuando despertaron vieron su gloria y los dos hombres que estaban con él". También menciona que Pedro sugirió poner tiendas mientras Moisés y Elías se iban.

7. La aparición de Moisés y Elías representan la Ley y los Profetas

Moisés y Elías representan los dos componentes principales del Antiguo Testamento: la Ley y los Profetas. Moisés fue el dador de la Ley y Elías fue considerado el mayor de los profetas.

8. La sugerencia de San Pedro fue errónea

El hecho de que la sugerencia de Pedro ocurra cuando Moisés y Elías se están preparando para partir revela un deseo de prolongar la experiencia de la gloria. Esto significa que Pedro se está centrando en lo incorrecto. La experiencia de la Transfiguración está destinada a señalar los sufrimientos que Jesús está a punto de experimentar. Está destinado a fortalecer la fe de los discípulos, revelándoles la mano divina que está trabajando en los eventos que Jesús sufrirá. Pedro pierde el punto y quiere quedarse en la montaña, al contrario del mensaje que Moisés y Elías han estado exponiendo. Como una reprensión aparente de esto, ocurre una teofanía: "Una nube vino y los cubrió con su sombra; y tuvieron miedo cuando entraron en la nube. Y una voz salió de la nube, diciendo: 'Este es mi Hijo, mi Elegido; ¡Escúchenlo!'".



Regresando a los tres pilares de la conversión, el ayuno es mucho más que el simple hecho de no comer, es aprender a negarme a mí mismo para que ya no sea yo quien vivo, sino Cristo que vive en mí. Es el negarme de ciertas cosas para dar vida a los demás. El ayudar es poner en práctica la caridad y la justicia social. Es buscar el cargar con nuestra propia cruz y ayudar a los demás con la de ellos. En otras palabras, es practicar la misma generosidad de Dios quien hace caer la lluvia sobre los buenos y los malos, es amar sin distinción de personas. Contemporáneamente, el orar es entrar en conversación con Dios, es recogerse para entrar en la presencia de Dios, con todo lo que uno es y todo lo que uno tiene, poniendo todo en las manos misericordiosas del Padre que nos ama. Esta Cuaresma procuremos hacer lo que debemos hacer todo el año: ayunar, ayudar y orar.




The second Sunday of Lent every year recalls the Transfiguration of the Lord. Since the fourth century, Mount Tabor has been the focus of devotion to this event. As mountains go, it is not particularly lofty, rising about fifteen hundred feet, within view of the Sea of Galilee and very close to Nazareth. Scripture doesn't identify the mountain, but in the year 348 Saint Cyril of Jerusalem said he preferred Mount Tabor to Mount Hermon as the site of the Transfiguration, and his opinion won. It has long been a strategic military site, and ancient fortresses are visible on the heights. Over the centuries, churches and fortified monasteries rose on the mountaintop, only to be destroyed by various invaders. Six hundred years ago, local Christians started to decorate the ruins with flags and banners on the Feast of the Transfiguration. In 1631, the Sultan granted permission to the Franciscans to live on Mount Tabor, and they have been there ever since, discovering the ruins of an old Crusader church and constructing the present church on the site in 1924. The top of the mountain is divided into Greek Orthodox and Latin (that's us) zones. At one time, tourists arrived on the summit by bus, but this is no longer permitted. Some ride bicycles up a challenging and winding path, while others take the four thousand three hundred steps constructed for Christian pilgrims in the fourth century. It's hard to imagine the fishermen following Jesus up this craggy mountain without complaint. Visitors will sympathize with Peter's plan to construct booths and stay put with Jesus, Moses, and Elijah for a while, enjoying the view, and planning the trip back down. -Rev. James Field.

God tested Abraham by asking not for an ordinary sacrifice, which would have been a partial burning with the meat divided between God and the people and eaten by those who sacrificed, but for a holocaust, a total burning of the sacrificial animal. This type of sacrifice consecrated the entire offering to God alone. This is what God was asking of Abraham in offering his only son, Isaac. When Abraham demonstrated his obedience, that was enough. This story from today's scriptures foretells the completion of the blood sacrifices of the old covenant in the new covenant: the blood of God's own Son, offered to us on the cross and in the Eucharist. Abraham's obedience foreshadows the obedience of Jesus to God's promise of salvation. The obedience of Abraham is rewarded in the birth to him, through Isaac, of many nations. The obedience of Jesus is rewarded in the salvation of all people for all time. -Arch 18 JSP
