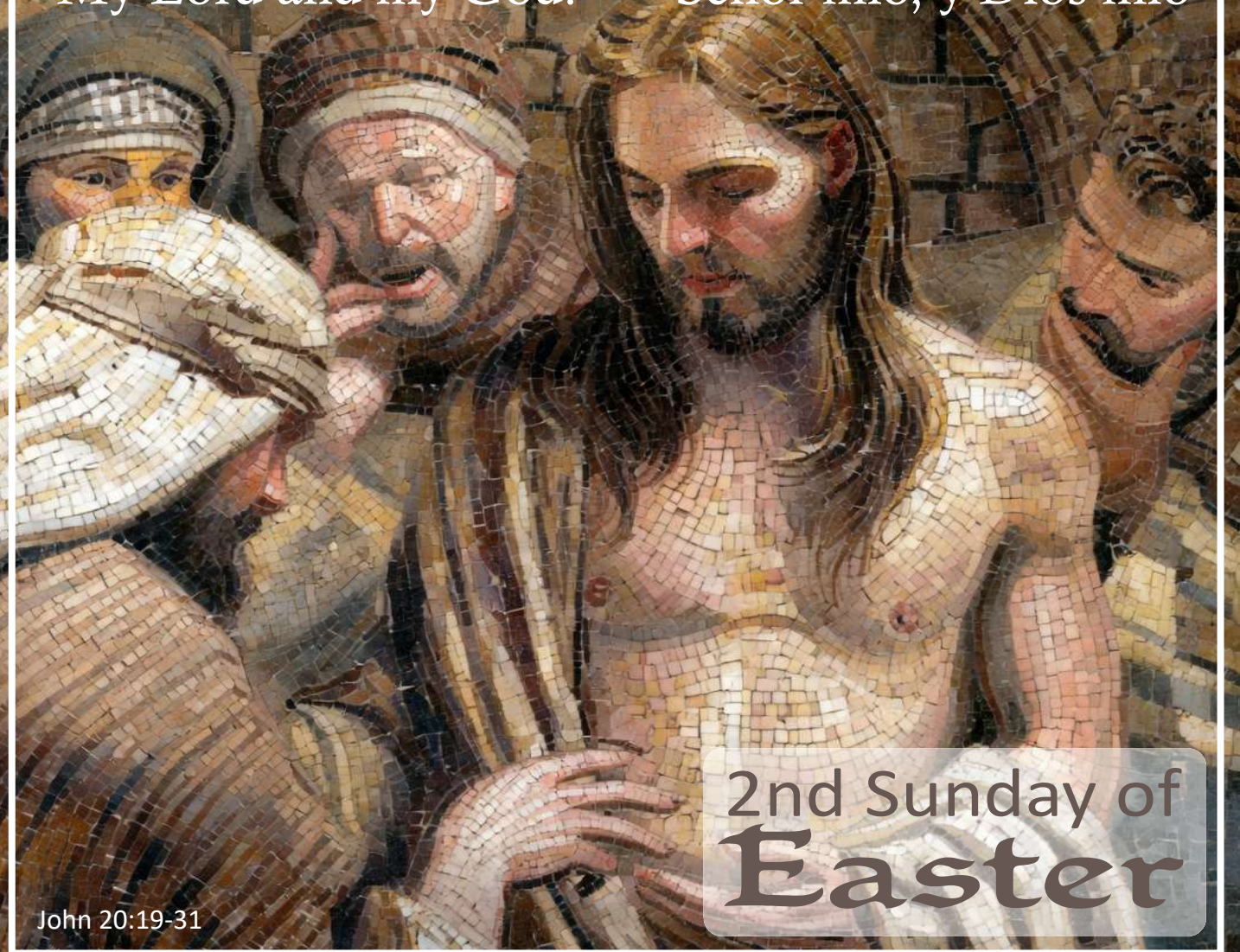

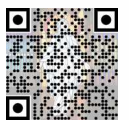

DIVINE MERCY

Divine Mercy Sunday is the Second Sunday of Easter, honoring God's infinite mercy as revealed to St. Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s. Officially established by Pope St. John Paul II in 2000, it features veneration of the Divine Mercy Image ("Jesus, I trust in You"), praying the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, and the Novena starting on Good Friday. Participants with proper dispositions (Confession, Holy Communion, prayer for the Pope, and detachment from sin) can receive a plenary indulgence and special graces.

2nd SUNDAY OF EASTER:
PEACE, MERCY AND BELIEF

There are times in our lives when we become aware of the beauty around us, especially when we see persons and nature through the lens of faith, capturing the sense of sacramentality of both awesome and simple things in life.

There are themes in the Scriptures and prayers of the Mass today that nurture belief and gratitude.

In recent Tradition, this Sunday is called Divine Mercy Sunday, a feast designated in the year 2000, building on both the Scriptures which speak so strongly of the divine mercy of Jesus towards all persons who turn their hearts to the Lord, and on the visions of St. Faustina. All the Scriptures teach us of God's presence and grace – from the Acts of the Apostles, the Psalm, the first letter of St. Peter and the Gospel selection from John. We have just celebrated the Easter feast, with all the gladness and graces of Baptism, Confirmation and First Eucharist of our neophytes. We have renewed our own baptismal promises and been blessed with the baptismal water again! We become caught up in prayer for all of us who continue on the faith journey. The Gospel of the Resurrection is hope-filled and reassuring – our Risen Lord is always with us! The first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we learn how the disciples continued their mission



Every year, on this Second Sunday, the Gospel speaks of the small group of disciples gathered in fear, and the sudden strengthening presence and mercy of Jesus who assures them of "Peace!" Well, except for Thomas – who wasn't there that first time – who isn't quite sure about the reports. It's one thing to hear the stories of fellow disciples; it may be quite another thing to know in his own heart that in fact, Jesus is risen. Jesus knew and understood the question of Thomas, and responds to his doubt. This is one of the great delights of the post-resurrection stories. Jesus knows us in the same way, our questions, our need for reassurance, the hungers of our human heart, for someone we can truly believe in and follow. What a blessing that Jesus knows and understands. May we continue to grow in our belief in Jesus, alive, present and with us always!

IMAGES OF JESUS



Do you have a favorite image of Jesus? There are many images of Jesus that depict different parts of the life of Jesus, an infant in a manger, a child or youth in the carpenter shop with Joseph, with the Holy Family, a preacher, healer, friend, teacher, or throughout the passion, death and resurrection of his life. We also can find images that express his Jewish nature, and those that depict Him in various cultures throughout the world. Some of us may have a treasured picture of the Good Shepherd, or images of Jesus healing, teaching, listening or forgiving someone. Pictures of Jesus with his disciples, or the two on the road to Emmaus, eating with others or calming the stormy lake are among favorites.

On this Divine Mercy Sunday, we see a particular image of Jesus as given through St. Faustina and the vision she had which then became the beloved image of Jesus given to us now. With the emphasis on the Blood of Christ and His love and mercy, it is the reminder that we are called to be active in our faith, trusting and prayerful, attentive to ways to be of service to others, to live out the teachings of Jesus in our everyday life. "Jesus, I trust in You" is the prayer so familiar to those who know of this devotion.

Other images of Jesus linked to the Easter season Gospels enrich us throughout these 50 days: Easter Sunday's scriptures of Jesus assuring Mary and later the apostles that indeed he is risen, the attentiveness of Jesus in assuring Thomas that it is he himself, the listener and teacher walking with the two disciples on the way home to Emmaus, the Good Shepherd, Jesus blessing his disciples as he sends them out on mission... and so many more. And all these weeks we hear of the interactions of Jesus with the apostles and disciples in the first readings from the Acts of the Apostles.

Take time to reflect on what your image of Jesus is and how you can connect more deeply with the Risen Christ in your own life, Jesus as present with you always, teacher, guide, friend and redeemer, Son of God. Amen!

2do Domingo de Pascua

PAZ, MISERICORDIA Y FE

Hay momentos en nuestra vida en los que tomamos conciencia de la belleza que nos rodea, especialmente cuando vemos a las personas y a la naturaleza a través del lente de la fe, captando el sentido de la sacramentalidad tanto de las cosas sublimes como de las sencillas de la vida. Hay temas en las Escrituras y en las oraciones de la Misa de hoy que nutren la fe y la gratitud.



En la Tradición más reciente, este domingo se llama ****Domingo de la Divina Misericordia****, una fiesta instituida en el año 2000, que se basa tanto en las Escrituras —que hablan con tanta fuerza de la misericordia divina de Jesús hacia todas las personas que vuelven su corazón al Señor— como en las visiones de Santa Faustina. Todas las lecturas nos enseñan sobre



la presencia y la gracia de Dios: desde los Hechos de los Apóstoles, el Salmo, la primera carta de San Pedro y el pasaje del Evangelio según San Juan.

Acabamos de celebrar la fiesta de Pascua, con toda la alegría y las gracias del Bautismo, la Confirmación y la Primera Eucaristía de nuestros neófitos. ¡Hemos renovado nuestras propias promesas bautismales y hemos sido bendecidos nuevamente con el agua bautismal! Nos

dejamos envolver en la oración por todos los que continuamos en el camino de la fe. El Evangelio de la Resurrección está lleno de esperanza y consuelo: ¡nuestro Señor Resucitado está siempre con nosotros!

En la primera lectura de los Hechos de los Apóstoles, aprendemos cómo los discípulos continuaron su misión.

Cada año, en este Segundo Domingo de Pascua, el Evangelio nos habla de ese pequeño grupo de discípulos reunidos con miedo, y de la presencia repentina, fortalecedora y misericordiosa de Jesús, que les asegura: «¡La paz esté con ustedes!». Bueno, excepto por Tomás, que no estaba presente aquella primera vez y que no está del todo convencido de los relatos. Una cosa es oír las historias de los demás discípulos; puede ser algo muy distinto saber en el propio corazón que, en efecto, Jesús ha resucitado. Jesús conocía y comprendía la duda de Tomás, y responde a ella. Esta es una de las grandes maravillas de los relatos posteriores a la resurrección. Jesús nos conoce de la misma manera: nuestras preguntas, nuestra necesidad de consuelo, los anhelos de nuestro corazón humano, el deseo de alguien en quien podamos creer verdaderamente y a quien podamos seguir. ¡Qué bendición que Jesús nos conozca y nos comprenda! Que podamos seguir creciendo en nuestra fe en Jesús, vivo, presente y siempre con nosotros.

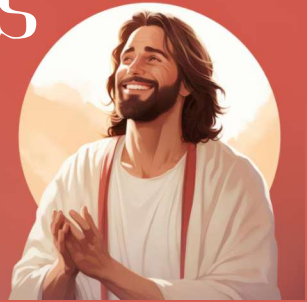

¿Tienes una imagen favorita de Jesús? Hay muchas imágenes de Jesús que representan diferentes etapas de su vida: un niño en el pesebre, un niño o joven en el

taller de carpintería con José, con la Sagrada Familia, como predicador, sanador, amigo, maestro, o a lo largo de su pasión, muerte y resurrección. También podemos encontrar imágenes que expresan su naturaleza judía, y aquellas que lo representan en diversas culturas alrededor del mundo. Algunos tienen una imagen muy querida del Buen Pastor, o imágenes de Jesús sanando, enseñando, escuchando o perdonando a alguien. Las imágenes de Jesús con sus discípulos, o con los dos en el camino de Emaús, comiendo con otros o calmando el lago tormentoso están entre las favoritas.

En este Domingo de la Divina Misericordia, vemos una imagen particular de Jesús, la que se nos dio a través de Santa Faustina y la visión que ella tuvo, que se convirtió en la querida imagen de Jesús que ahora conocemos. Con el énfasis en la Sangre de Cristo y en su amor y misericordia, nos recuerda que estamos llamados a ser activos en nuestra fe, confiados y orantes, atentos a las formas de servir a los demás y de vivir las enseñanzas de Jesús en nuestra vida cotidiana. “Jesús, en Ti confío” es la oración tan familiar para quienes conocen esta devoción.

Y todas estas semanas escuchamos en las primeras lecturas de los Hechos de los Apóstoles las interacciones de Jesús con los apóstoles y discípulos.

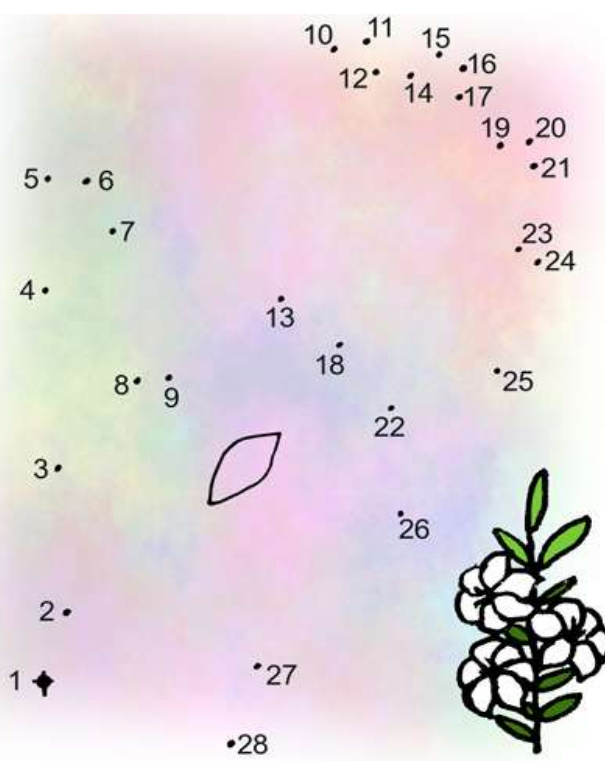

THE TABERNACLE LAMP

The origins of the custom of burning a lamp before the tabernacle are in Jewish worship, where a lamp called ner tamid or "eternal flame" burns before the ark in every synagogue. The ark contains

the sacred scrolls of the Torah. The flame represents the menorah in the Temple, and therefore is never extinguished. In fact, the word "tabernacle" itself is derived from Hebrew, as taber is the Hebrew word for "tent," and hearkens back to the forty years of wandering in the desert. The pilgrim people were sustained in hope by an awareness that God was not only in the pillar of cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night, but had quite literally "pitched his tent with them" in the shelter for the Ark of the Covenant. Some artisans have used this theme of "ark" or "tent" to design a tabernacle for the Blessed Sacrament. In Christian practice, Anglicans and Catholics use a sanctuary lamp to point toward the presence of the reserved sacrament, and Lutherans use it as a sign of God's presence in the house of worship, but not necessarily as a clue that the Eucharist is reserved. Why, even in an age of electric light, is the sanctuary lamp an oil light or candle? Perhaps not only to point to Christ, the light of the world, but also to point to sacrifice. For the light to exist, there must be sacrifice. The oil or wax is transformed into light, just as those who pray here, or who will receive viaticum from here, are called to transformation in Christ.

SAINT BENEDICT JOSEPH LABRE

April 17



Benedict Joseph Labre was truly eccentric, one of God's special little ones. Born in France and the eldest of 18 children, he studied under his uncle, a parish priest. Because of poor health and a lack of suitable academic preparation he was unsuccessful in his attempts to enter the religious life. Then, at age 16, a profound change took place. Benedict lost his desire to study and gave up all thoughts of the priesthood, much to the consternation of his relatives. He became a pilgrim, traveling from one great shrine to another, living off alms. He wore the rags of a beggar and shared his food with the poor. Filled with the love of God and neighbor, Benedict had special devotion to the Blessed Mother and to the Blessed Sacrament. In Rome, where he lived in the Colosseum for a time, he was called "the poor man of the Forty Hours devotion" and "the beggar of Rome." The people accepted his ragged appearance better than he did. His excuse to himself was that "our comfort is not in this world." On April 16, 1783, the last day of his life, Benedict dragged himself to a church in Rome and prayed there for two hours before he collapsed, dying peacefully in a nearby house. Immediately after his death, the people proclaimed him a saint. Benedict Joseph Labre was canonized by Pope Leo XIII in 1881. His liturgical feast is celebrated on April 16. Saint Benedict Joseph Labre: Pray for us!

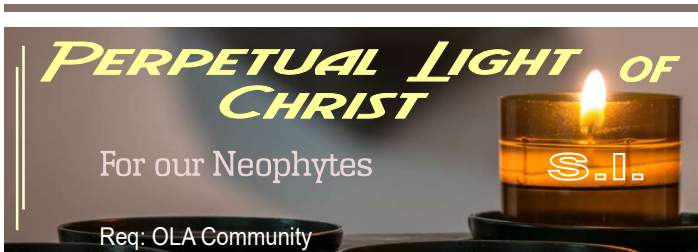
