restored, he was baptized, and he began preaching Christianity. Renamed Paul, he became one of the faith's most important missionaries and writers, and his conversion is seen as a powerful example of transformation through divine grace.

## ORDINARY TIME

In Catholic liturgy, Ordinary Time is often misunderstood because of the modern meaning of the word "ordinary." In common usage, ordinary suggests something routine, unremarkable, or lacking special significance. That is not what the Church intends by the term. The word Ordinary in Ordinary Time comes not from the Latin ordinarius meaning "plain" or "everyday," but from ordo, meaning order, sequence, or arrangement. Ordinary Time is therefore ordered time—time that is counted, structured, and numbered. This is why the Sundays are explicitly designated as: the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, and so on. Today we are currently celebrating the Third Sunday in Ordinary time.

# REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY



January 25, 2026  
3rd SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:  
CALLED TO DISCIPLESHIP

God calls, heals, and protects his Chosen people, though they first suffered persecution and oppression. The words of Isaiah in the first reading are referred to directly in the Gospel. Matthew's community, those who heard and read this Gospel, were primarily Jews for whom Matthew was making a specific correlation between the words of the prophet and the fulfillment of that prophecy. In the Gospel, the call of the first disciples was a call into the light of the savior. In these early weeks of Ordinary Time in our liturgical year, the Gospel introduces us to the call of the disciples, the work of discipleship and the teachings of Jesus. Today, following the stories of the Baptism of Jesus, we hear how Jesus undertakes the mission of the Father – to call together those who will become disciples and who follow him "immediately". Imagine how the lives of the apostles changed – and that of all their families – when they left their way of life as fishermen at once to follow Jesus.

Jesus begins his teaching with the call for reform, to conversion, for the kingdom of heaven is near at hand. This proclamation is about change, and the change is dramatic as portrayed in the lives of the first disciples. It is visible in the lives of those who were healed, and who heard and responded to the good news of kingdom. The kingdom, the disciples soon learned, was not an overthrow of oppressors, but a call into the light of faith, into a way of life that made evident the goodness, love, and mercy of God.

We are, by our baptism, called to follow the way of the apostles – to learn from Jesus and become faithful disciples. It is our vocation – it is what the graces of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist and all sacraments are about. May we be blessed, guided and encouraged as we continue our faith journeys together. Particularly as we gather as a community of faith to celebrate Eucharist, we are able to re-discover the blessings of our baptism and the Eucharist to nourish us to live in the light of the Gospel life each day!



## THIN PLACES: GRACE



Thinking about the times and places where the fishermen met Jesus and heard his voice that called to them, and their response, I remember a term

for that kind of encounter: a "thin place". In Celtic spirituality, it is a place/time where God and humanity meet in a mysterious way: an encounter with a person, with beauty or mystery, where sacredness reaches beyond the ordinary. Like the disciples at this encounter with Jesus, or Blessed Mother Mary at times in her life, like many of the persons we read about in Scriptures or the lives of the saints, there are thin places where an encounter invited a movement forward into faith and discipleship. Perhaps a time or two in your life or mine, we have found ourselves on the threshold of a thin place, an opening into something sacred within ourselves that calls us to conversion and the risk of discipleship.

This may be a time for each of us to step away from the busyness of our calendar, and plan ahead for some significant quiet time for prayer, for being in awe of nature, for giving an opening to the Spirit to speak to us, for listening, for responding from our heart. In her book, "Braving the Thin Places", Julianne Stanz explores some of the times and places of holiness that open us to transformation. It requires courage and vulnerability, a willingness to recognize that God is near and dear, she writes. Pain, loneliness and bereavement are times of thinness, where we can encounter not only our own threshold, but accompany others into a deeper realization of God's nearness and the sacredness of life, faith and true community.

Our discipleship, our spirituality must be rooted in relationship – with God and with one another. Our gentleness with one another and with ourselves, our forgiveness of others and of ourselves, and the trust it takes to start anew time and time again are part of accepting the grace of God's love for and mercy toward each of us. It is a thin place where the light is able to get in and shine forth. It is grace and gift.



# Tradiciones de Nuestra Fe



Faltan solo cinco semanas, y los ministros parroquiales, especialmente si están implicados en el catecumenado, ya tienen la mirada puesta en la Cuaresma y el Triduo Pascual. Hasta tiempos relativamente recientes, los últimos días antes de Pascua estaban marcados por una conciencia de la Pasión, pero los fieles quedaban librados a sus propios recursos para saber cómo involucrarse con estos misterios. Hace mil años, la Vigilia Pascual como momento solemne y central de la iniciación había desaparecido. A comienzos de la década de 1950 era un acontecimiento menor en la vida parroquial, celebrado el sábado santo por la mañana, por lo general solo con los sacerdotes y un pequeño grupo de invitados. La mayoría de la gente la entendía como necesaria únicamente para la bendición del cirio pascual y la preparación del agua pascual. Quienes eran niños durante la Segunda Guerra Mundial a veces recuerdan que la prueba semanal al mediodía de las sirenas antiaéreas en sábado santo señalaba el final de la Cuaresma. Hoy, por supuesto, vemos el sábado santo como plenamente integrado en el ayuno pascual, y difícilmente como un momento para que los niños corran entre la hierba de plástico buscando caramelos de goma y huevos de chocolate. Estos recuerdos apuntan a un colapso total de las liturgias que alguna vez fueron centrales en el año cristiano. Este empobrecimiento de la liturgia fue en gran medida un accidente de la historia. La causa de fondo fue la pérdida de la Cuaresma como tiempo centrado en la formación final de los catecúmenos para los sacramentos pascuales. Hacia 1880, los estudiosos comenzaron a reconstruir una visión de lo que había sido en otro tiempo y, lentamente, al principio en un puñado de monasterios de Europa, se redescubrieron y celebraron fragmentos de la tradición.

## RE+TABLOS

Los retablos de metal son famosos en muchas partes de Latinoamérica. Estos pequeños retablos o laminas contienen imágenes de Cristo, la Santísima Trinidad, María, los ángeles u otro santo/a sobre lámina para decorar los altares familiares de los hogares hispanos. Aunque los retablos

no siempre siguen las normas del arte cristiano, los retablos latinoamericanos son bellos ejemplos de la mezcla de culturas amerindias, europeas y africanas. Pero no todos los retablos son pequeños. En muchas iglesias coloniales de Latinoamérica se encuentran retablos gigantescos cubiertos de oro y joyas que recuerdan los grandes retablos europeos, pero con el folclor latinoamericano. Cuando la Iglesia fue construyendo sus, los retablos empezaron a formar parte de la decoración de muchos santuarios y tomaron dimensiones impresionantes. 8

Dios llama, sana y protege a su pueblo elegido, aunque primero haya sufrido persecución y opresión. Las palabras de Isaías en la primera lectura se mencionan directamente en el Evangelio. La comunidad de Mateo, aquellos que escucharon y leyeron este Evangelio, estaba compuesta principalmente por judíos, para quienes Mateo establecía una correlación específica entre las palabras del profeta y el cumplimiento de esa profecía. En el Evangelio, la llamada de los primeros discípulos fue una llamada a entrar en la luz del Salvador. En estas primeras semanas del Tiempo Ordinario de nuestro año litúrgico, el Evangelio nos introduce a la llamada de los discípulos, al trabajo del discipulado y a las enseñanzas de Jesús. Hoy, siguiendo los relatos del Bautismo de Jesús, escuchamos cómo Jesús emprende la misión del Padre: reunir a aquellos que llegarán a ser discípulos y que lo siguen “inmediatamente”. Imaginemos cómo cambiaron las vidas de los apóstoles —y las de todas sus familias— cuando dejaron de inmediato su modo de vida como pescadores para seguir a Jesús.

Jesús comienza su enseñanza con un llamado a la reforma, a la conversión, porque el Reino de los cielos está cerca. Esta proclamación trata sobre el cambio, y el cambio es dramático, como se refleja en la vida de los primeros discípulos. Es visible en la vida de quienes fueron sanados y de quienes escucharon y respondieron a la Buena Nueva del Reino. El Reino, pronto aprendieron los discípulos, no era un derrocamiento de los opresores, sino una llamada a la luz de la fe, a un modo de vida que hacía evidente la bondad, el amor y la misericordia de Dios.

Nosotros, por nuestro bautismo, estamos llamados a seguir el camino de los apóstoles: aprender de Jesús y llegar a ser discípulos fieles. Es nuestra vocación; es de lo que tratan las gracias del Bautismo, la Confirmación y la Eucaristía, y de todos los sacramentos. Que seamos bendecidos, guiados y alentados mientras continuamos juntos nuestro camino de fe. Particularmente cuando nos reunimos como comunidad de fe para celebrar la Eucaristía, podemos redescubrir las bendiciones de nuestro bautismo y de la Eucaristía, que nos nutre para vivir cada día a la luz de la vida del Evangelio.

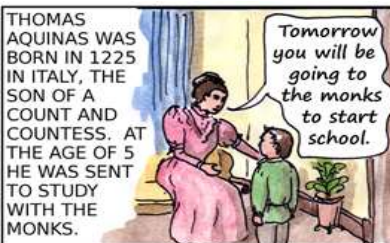

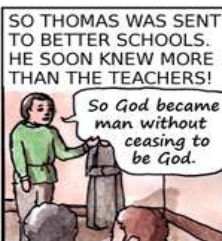

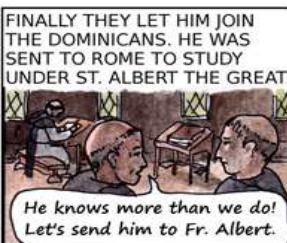

While you might have to reach for an atlas to determine that Isaiah is speaking about Galilee, today's first

reading (part of which was read at Christmas) is prophetic of Jesus' future ministry in that province. The light that brings salvation and rejoicing is, ultimately, Christ. Liberation is the theme: liberation from both ignorance ("darkness") and sin (the "yoke"). As Isaiah identifies a place, so Paul describes an attitude: the attitude that develops, even among good people, of equating their own will with the common good. This always brings dissension, and so it has done in Corinth. Paul will not allow this; we are all members of "Christ's party." The gospel is not to divide us. Matthew quotes from Isaiah in today's Gospel, presenting Jesus as the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecies. The theme is "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 4:17). To spread this message, Jesus begins to select disciples, four of whom we meet today: Peter, Andrew, James, and John.
