REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

March 31, 2024
EASTER: NEW LIFE AND HOPE

Alleluia! It is the feast of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ as we gather today in a community of faith, part of a much larger Communion of Saints! As we hear the first stories of the disciples and the risen Jesus, we also reflect back on our journey of faith. Especially the past days of the Sacred Triduum, we have traveled through the Paschal Mystery in faith with Jesus.

If we have done Lent well, this will be a unique and sacred time of realizing that in fact, we, too, have emerged from the tomb of our old selves into a new life of deeper faith and discipleship, renewed in the spirit of Christ Jesus.

Throughout the season of Lent, we have been opening our hearts and minds to the power and splendor of the Risen Christ. This is the time of baptismal freshness, of welcoming new members into our Faith Community – through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. We have celebrated the Easter Vigil, and celebrate this Sunday – and even more so on "Mercy Sunday", next Sunday -- as our parish community continues to welcome new members with great joy! It is the time to welcome those Christians who have become part of our Catholic Christian community through Reception into Full Communion! And for the majority of our church members, it is the time to renew our baptismal promises – our promises to reject Satan, evil and temptations -- and through the Creed we profess our belief in and adherence to, the Catholic Christian life of recognizing and following the risen Christ Jesus.

Easter is the highlight of the Church's Year of Grace, the Liturgical Year. After 40 days of Lent we begin our fifty days of Easter. The **first reading** each of the Easter Season Sundays is from the Acts of the Apostles: the young Church, strengthened by the gift of the Holy Spirit, preaches the Risen Christ! Let us hear again the story of the empty tomb in the Gospel. The risen Jesus lives within us today! We each are called to new life! We encounter the living Christ in our daily lives when we have the eyes to see, the faith to believe, the courage to celebrate! This is "prime time" for our spiritual renewal and rededication to discipleship. May our lives and faith be an example for our neophytes as their new life is a grace and gift for us!

IMMEDIATE PREPARATION



Having prayed to the Lamb of God to take away our sins and grant us mercy and peace, we take moments for our immediate preparation. We are invited to behold the Lamb of God, Jesus Christ, who takes away sins. We acknowledge our unworthiness adapting the acclamation of the centurion in Matthew's Gospel; we seek spiritual healing, trusting that the Lord hears and responds to our plea: his Word can heal our soul.

Prayer and awareness can move our hearts and minds, becoming aware that we each are part of the Mystical Body of Christ. As we make our individual preparations to join in the liturgy from the very beginning, we sing, pray and celebrate as a community of faith. This one Eucharist is shared by all the community, presider, ministers and the faithful. Today the presiding priest, as leader of the celebration, in accord with ancient usage, remains the first to receive the consecrated Bread and Wine. Though this differs from the way we may welcome and serve others at meals in our homes, it acknowledges the role of our ordained presider who has consecrated for us the Bread of life, the Body and Blood of Christ.

Our actions of walking reverently forward, to reach out and receive the Eucharist is indeed our communion, our becoming in a more sacred way, one with Jesus Christ and one with one another. Our minds can reach across the aisle, across the church, across the community, the country, the world and in this sacred moment, bond with the People of God everywhere and for all time. Jesus comes to us. The Body of Christ. Amen.
The Blood of Christ. Amen!



¿SON CRISTIANOS LOS HUEVOS DE PASCUA?

Se pintan, se esconden, se hacen de chocolate... los huevitos de Pascua se han convertido en un artículo súper comercial en Pascua. ¿Pero hasta qué punto realmente tienen algo que ver con el verdadero significado de esta fiesta y se vinculan con el catolicismo? Para aquellos que disfrutan de esta tradición, les tengo buenas noticias. El huevo de Pascua se puede rastrear hasta la época medieval en Europa. En aquellos tiempos, los huevos eran la fuente principal de proteína de las clases más populares, pero cuando llegaba la Cuaresma, debían dejar de comerlos, ya que las normas de la Iglesia eran más estrictas y, además de carne, se prohibía el consumo de cualquiera de sus derivados también. Muchos huevos se perdían durante esta temporada, hasta que se dieron cuenta de que aquellos que recogían cerca del fin de la Cuaresma, si los hervían, los podían conservar hasta el día de Pascua y comerlos ese día en forma de celebración. Los huevos se convirtieron así en un símbolo de Pascua y, además, se les dio esa connotación que también representaban la resurrección del Señor, porque al romper la cáscara (era como la salida de la tumba), encontrabas una nueva vida. Lo de pintarlos fue tiempo después. Al tener tantos huevos hervidos almacenados, muchos empezaron a decorarlos. Como en esa época no existían las pinturas de ahora, se usaban métodos naturales. Por ejemplo, se empleaba jugo de remolacha. De hecho, en la Iglesia ortodoxa, se pintan los huevos de color rojo (por la sangre de Cristo) y son bendecidos durante la vigilia pascual para abrirlos el domingo. En cuanto a la búsqueda de los huevos, se dice que lo ideó Martín Lutero, quien quería emular cuando las mujeres y apóstoles buscaron el cuerpo de Jesús pensando que lo habían robado.

¿Y LOS CONEJOS?

De nuevo, nos remontamos a la época del medioevo, donde la gente empezó a tener dudas sobre la razón de la alta capacidad de reproducción de estos animalitos. Muchos creían que era que los conejos eran capaces de hacerlo sin necesidad de un contacto sexual, por lo que enseguida se les relacionó con la Virgen María y, de hecho, varios pintores empezaron a retratar a nuestra Madre cargando o rodeada de conejos blancos (color de la pureza). Uno de los cuadros más famosos es La Virgen del Conejo de Tiziano, que se encuentra en el Museo Louvre. Así que, aunque muchos crean que el conejo y los huevos de Pascua son ritos paganos, en realidad son elementos que se cristianizaron hace muchos siglos. Lo importante es saber conectar estas prácticas con nuestra fe (especialmente explicarlo a los niños) y, sobre todo, que no dejemos que sea lo principal en este día, donde lo importante es celebrar y reflexionar sobre la victoria de Cristo frente a la muerte. Y no hay mayor símbolo de la Pascua que la luz.



¿QUÉ SIGNIFICA LA PALABRA PASCUA?

Pascua viene de una palabra hebrea pesah que quiere decir "lugar de pastos" e indica el final de un periodo de ayuno. La Pascua Judía celebra la libertad del cautiverio de Egipto. El cristianismo, siendo en su origen una secta judía, tomó la fiesta de la Pascua para celebrar la muerte y resurrección de Jesús quien nos da la libertad del cautiverio pecaminoso de nuestras vidas. Eventualmente el uso de "Pascua" pasó a indicar cualquier evento en la vida de Jesús que añade a la libertad que nos obtuvo en su vida, cruz y resurrección. He aquí porque tradicionalmente se hablaba de la Pascua del Nacimiento, la Pascua Florida o Pascua de Resurrección y la Pascua del Espíritu Santo (Pentecostés) y todavía en grandes fiestas religiosas del año la gente se saluda con "Felices pascuas".

Easter is the time when we celebrate Jesus' rising from the dead.

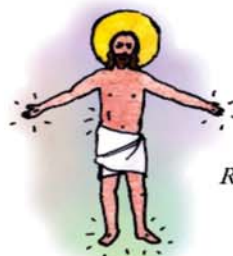

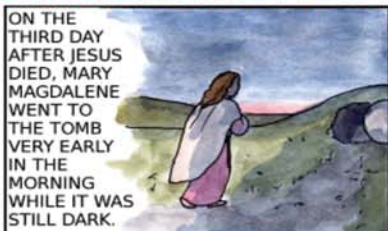
Then they began to **BELIEVE**, because they hadn't known the **SCRIPTURE** that said that Jesus must **RISE** from the **DEAD**.

REJOICE

We rejoice because our faith in Christ has been vindicated, truth has triumphed over falsity, justice over injustice and tragedy has turned into comedy. The story of the suffering and death of Jesus on Good Friday is the story of the triumph of falsity over truth, of injustice over justice, of evil over goodness. Jesus was falsely charged of crimes he did not commit, and unjustly sentenced to a death he

did not deserve. His good friend betrayed him, his trusted companions deserted him and his number one man denied him. The people he loved demanded his crucifixion and chose to have the bandit Barabbas released in his place. It is a story of betrayal and lies, dishonesty and meanness, unfaithfulness and wicked violence directed against an innocent and apparently helpless victim. All this comes to a head on Good Friday when we see Jesus scourged, mocked, led on the death march, nailed to the cross where he dies after a few hours and hastily buried in a tomb. If that were the end of the story that would be a bad story, a tragedy. But glory be to God it is not. Death is not the end of the story. There is one more chapter. And in the last chapter of the story of Jesus we see him rise from the dead in all glory and majesty. He is vindicated. His enemies are shamed and confused. Jesus regains his eternal glory with the Father. He is the Lord who will prevail over all humankind, his enemies included. For us his embattled followers this is good news.

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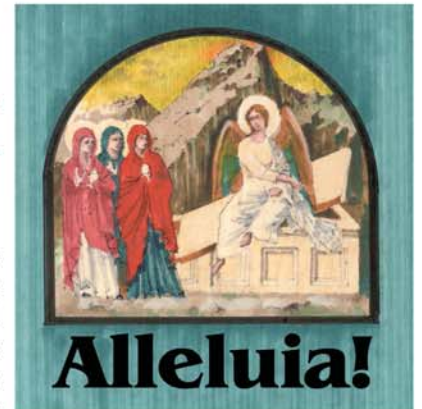
