# Kingship

The book of Samuel recounts for us today the anointing of David as king of Israel. It was the elders of Israel who declared David king that day, but it was God who called David to shepherd Israel. Thus mandated by the citizens of his kingdom and by his God, David took his place in a long line of kings. The apostle Paul speaks to us of kingship as well, but on a much higher plane: the kingship of Jesus our Lord. As great as David was, he and all earthly monarchs who came before and after him in their kingdoms around the world are minor kings by comparison to the true King. And lastly, we hear the story of that true King in perhaps his weakest moment: near death, hanging on a cross, taunted by a common criminal and by the world at large.

# REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

"As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord," proclaims Joshua (24:15), successor to Moses and leader of the Israelites, as he leads

them in their renewal of their Covenant with God. In the first reading, from the second Book of Samuel, all the tribes of Israel claim David as their king. Here again we understand the importance of the people of God honoring their leaders who are faithful to God and the Covenant, who lead them with vision and strength.


In the Letter to the Colossians, Paul gives his followers, and us, a beautiful hymn of praise to God and the Son of God, Jesus. The profound faith of Paul and his followers is expressed with hope and trust.

On this feast which closes the current Liturgical Year, we hear in the Gospel, the proclamation from Calvary – "This is the king of the Jews." Jesus Christ is proclaimed king, but his throne is the cross – the measure of his love for humankind. This feast celebrates the mystery of the cross and the resurrection – life eternal – the Paschal Mystery of death and resurrection – as our call to accept the gift of salvation. We are called to be disciples.

When members of our parish and those who intend to become full members through the sacraments of initiation, we recognize the central place of the cross in our lives – a cross of conversion and a cross of glory. We also see that the Scriptures – in the context of liturgy and in our own daily spiritual reading – show us where and how to encounter the living Christ.

To remember that Christ is King and we called to be followers of this king is also a call to look honestly at our lives and see that there is room for improvement in order to become more faithful disciples! The Lord does reign here – in our hearts, our lives, our homes. Let us continue to grow in faith and service! May we continue to pray for one another, and especially for all those who are on their faith journey toward Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist!

#### A VERY GOOD READ



The New Testament, especially the four Gospels, are most likely the most familiar part of the Bible for Christians, and even for those who are not of the Christian faith. A bit of introduction helps readers to understand that the first three Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke)

are called synoptic Gospels, since they follow a somewhat similar format and style of writing as they recount the life, teachings, passion. death and resurrection of Jesus.

Mark's Gospel is the shortest and, most scholars conclude, the first one written. The Gospels attributed to Matthew and Luke have some of the same material as Mark, though written somewhat differently, for different readers (faith communities of disciples) of their time. Each of the four Gospels contain some unique material; there are a few crucial events that are contained in all four. A deeper exploration of the Gospels is truly a beneficial study.

The Book of Acts gives us the event of Pentecost, glimpses of the early communities of Christians, the apostles' work of spreading the Good News, the challenges and persecution faced by believers, the dedication of the apostles and disciples to spreading the Good News of Jesus, and the missionary journeys of Paul. The themes of Acts emphasize God's continuing saving activity in both the story of Israel and the Christian community, the work of the Holy Spirit in gathering the "ecclesia", the communities of faith called together by God, and the teachings of the apostles as they continue their ministry.

The "Letters" include those of Paul to the "churches" he has founded and to individual leaders of some of the communities, the letters of James, Peter (2), John (3) Jude, and Hebrews, whose author is unknown. The Book of Revelation, written in apocalyptic style, is the final book in the canonical New Testament, written by John as a record the visions and messages he experienced. For us, it is a call to change our ways to become ever more faithful in our commitment to live the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

# Ritos de Entrada al Catecumenado y de Bienvenida

Además, celebramos con alegría el Rito de Bienvenida para los candidatos ya bautizados, hermanos y hermanas que recibieron el Bautismo en la Iglesia Católica y que ahora desean completar su iniciación cristiana a través de la Confirmación y la Eucaristía. La Iglesia los acoge con cariño, reafirma su fe y se compromete a acompañarlos en su crecimiento espiritual. Los signos litúrgicos son similares a los del rito de los catecúmenos, incluyendo la signación con la cruz; sin embargo, no se les entrega el Evangelio, pues ya han sido incorporados a la Palabra mediante el Bautismo.

Acojamos a todos estos hermanos con los brazos abiertos y el amor de Cristo. Acompañémoslos con nuestra oración, apoyo y presencia fraterna, caminando juntos como una sola comunidad de fe. ¡Que el amor de Dios siga transformando sus vidas y también la nuestra!

## UNA BUENA LECTURA

El Nuevo Testamento, especialmente los cuatro Evangelios, es probablemente la parte más familiar de la Biblia para los cristianos, e incluso

para quienes no profesan la fe cristiana. Una breve introducción ayuda a los lectores a comprender que los primeros tres Evangelios (Mateo, Marcos y Lucas) se llaman Evangelios sinópticos, ya que siguen un formato y estilo de escritura algo similar mientras relatan la vida, enseñanzas, pasión, muerte y resurrección de Jesús. El Evangelio de Marcos es el más corto y, según concluyen la mayoría de los estudiosos, el primero en ser escrito. Los Evangelios atribuidos a Mateo y Lucas contienen parte del mismo material que Marcos, aunque redactado de manera algo distinta, para diferentes lectores (comunidades de discípulos) de su tiempo. Cada uno de los cuatro Evangelios contiene material único: hav algunos acontecimientos cruciales que aparecen en los cuatro. Una exploración más profunda de los Evangelios es verdaderamente un estudio enriquecedor.

El Libro de los Hechos nos presenta el evento de Pentecostés, destellos de las primeras comunidades cristianas, la labor de los apóstoles anunciando la Buena Nueva, los desafíos y persecuciones enfrentados por los creyentes, la dedicación de los apóstoles y discípulos a difundir la Buena Nueva de Jesús, y los viajes misioneros de Pablo. Los temas de Hechos enfatizan la continua acción salvadora de Dios tanto en la historia de Israel como en la comunidad cristiana, la obra del Espíritu Santo en la formación de la ecclesia, las comunidades de fe convocadas por Dios, y las enseñanzas de los apóstoles mientras continúan su ministerio.

Las "Cartas" incluyen las de Pablo dirigidas a las "iglesias" que ha fundado y a líderes individuales de algunas comunidades, las cartas de Santiago, Pedro (2), Juan (3), Judas, y Hebreos, cuyo autor es desconocido. El Libro del Apocalipsis, escrito en estilo apocalíptico, es el último libro del Nuevo Testamento canónico, escrito por Juan como un registro de las visiones y mensajes que experimentó. Para nosotros, es un llamado a cambiar nuestra manera de vivir para ser cada vez más fieles en nuestro compromiso de vivir el Evangelio de Jesucristo.

Make sure you do something special today to celebrate the feast of Christ the King!



# Rite of Entrance into the Catechumenate and of Welcome

On this day when we joyfully celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, our parish is

filled with gladness as we take a very special step in the faith journey of several of our brothers and sisters. Today we will celebrate the Rite of Entrance into the Catechumenate, a liturgical celebration that marks the formal beginning of the journey for those who, not yet baptized, have decided to respond to Christ's call and join His Church.

As a community, we publicly acknowledge their sincere decision to follow Jesus and renew our commitment to accompany them with love in their process of conversion. From this moment on, the catechumens receive the blessing of participating more fully in the life of the Church, hearing the Word of God, and receiving blessings and exorcisms. Among the principal gestures are the signing with the cross on the forehead and the senses, a sign of belonging to Christ, and the presentation of the Gospel, as an expression of their access to the Word that enlightens their path.

We also joyfully celebrate the Rite of Welcome for the already-baptized candidates, brothers and sisters who received Baptism in the Catholic Church and who now wish to complete their Christian initiation through Confirmation and the Eucharist. The Church welcomes them with affection, reaffirms their faith, and commits to accompany them in their spiritual growth. The liturgical signs are similar to those of the catechumens, including the signing with the cross; however, the Gospel is not presented to them, since they have already been incorporated into the Word through Baptism.

Let us receive all these brothers and sisters with open arms and the love of Christ. Let us accompany them with our prayer, support, and fraternal presence, walking together as one community of faith. May the love of God continue transforming their lives—and ours as well!

### History and Tradition

Among the Catholics seeking religious freedom in America were the Carrolls of Maryland, who arrived in 1649 from Ireland via England. Charles Carroll, born in Annapolis in 1737, was the only Catholic signer of the Declaration of Independence, and was the

only Catholic signer of the Declaration of Independence, and was the longest-surviving signer. As was the custom for English Catholics, he attended English schools in Belgium and later university in France. By the time he signed the Declaration, he was the richest man in America, and his decision to sign would hardly go unnoticed by the king.

Because Carroll was so wealthy and because he was a Catholic, he had more to lose than the others. Those who signed became traitors to the Crown and risked losing everything. It is said that someone grumbled that there were many men in the world named Charles Carroll, and he could dodge responsibility if he had to. For that reason, he added a flair to his signature, "of Carrollton," making it clear that he put everything at risk.

His cousin John, also an ardent supporter of the American Revolution, was ordained a Jesuit priest and returned to Maryland at the outbreak of hostilities. Upheavals in Europe forced the Jesuit order to dissolve, leaving Carroll a secular priest. Ultimately, it was John Carroll who was asked to organize the Catholic Church in the new nation. No one was better positioned for this task, a cultured man from an esteemed family, a cherished friend of Benjamin Franklin and George Washington, and a man so thoroughly attuned to an undercurrent of anti-Catholicism in the colonies that he could charm powerful people to a new point of view.
