

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD, CELEBRATING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

April 7, 2024 2nd SUNDAY AFTER EASTER: DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY © Clare Colella

What is Divine Mercy Sunday and why does the Catholic Church celebrate this feast?

Entering into the Sundays of Easter season, the first readings each Sunday are from the Acts of the Apostles -- the early Church telling its story. Those selections, paired with the post-resurrection stories from the Gospels, give us a depth and richness that are affirming in our own faith journey. Today's theme is trust and belief – and that may well be part of the reason that the Church has titled this Sunday "Divine Mercy Sunday". When we truly deeply believe in the love, care, forgiveness and mercy of God, given us through Jesus and the Church, we can be empowered and strengthened to be persons of mercy, compassion and peace ourselves, continuing the mission Jesus gave to his disciples and to us!

The message of The Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us — all of us. God wants us to recognize that His mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon Him with trust, receive His mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share His joy.

The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

A - Ask for His Mercy. God wants us to approach Him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking Him to pour His mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.

B - Be merciful. God wants us to receive His mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love and forgiveness to others just as He does to us.

C - Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that all the graces of His mercy can only be received by our trust. The more we open the door of our hearts and lives to Him with trust, the more we can receive. "Jesus I trust in you" is the prayer we can pray and sing often.

This message and devotion to Jesus as The Divine Mercy is based on the writings of Saint Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to The Divine Mercy had begun to spread.

The Scriptures of today tell of the power of Jesus working within the community, in the preaching and bearing witness of the apostles together with the miracles they perform.

The Gospel shows the compassion and mercy of Jesus toward Thomas who needed a bit more "proof" of the Risen Jesus before he proclaims his belief. As members of a community of faith, we are called to be compassionate and generous toward those in need. With God's help and through grace, we do have the ability to make a difference each day in the lives of those we encounter.

BECOME WHAT YOU RECEIVE



Many years ago at a conference we were asked to reflect on a question: Why are there so many people who receive Eucharist every week and yet so little has changed in the world? It wasn't about people receiving communion, it was pondering about the fact that there seems to be so little impact of faith in the world today.

The language of the early Church fathers guided the Christians into a deeply held belief that as they shared in the Eucharist, it was their responsibility to live and often die – in defense of and in deference to their having shared in and become the Body of Christ.

St Augustine, in his Easter sermon to the neophytes (# 222) catechized them: "You are yourselves what you receive. I had promised those of you who have just been baptized a sermon to explain the sacrament of the Lord's table, which you can see right now.... You ought to know what you have received, what you are about to receive and what you ought to receive every day. That bread which you can see on the altar, sanctified by the word of God, is the body of Christ. That cup, or rather what the cup contains, sanctified by the word of God, is the blood of Christ. It is by means of these things that the Lord Christ wished to present us with his body and blood which he shed for our sake for the forgiveness of sins. If you receive them worthily, you are yourselves what you receive. You see, the apostle says, 'We, being many, are one loaf, one body.' (1 Cor 10:17). That's how he explained the sacrament of the Lord's table: one loaf, one body, is what we all are, many though we be." Augustine went on to teach: Behold what you are. Become what you receive: The Body of Christ. Amen.

Solemnidad de la Anunciación del Señor

Cada 25 de marzo, la Iglesia celebra la Solemnidad de la Anunciación del Señor. Es decir, se recuerda de manera solemne que, un día como hoy, la historia de la humanidad cambió de curso radicalmente.

Dios Todopoderoso invitaba a una humilde doncella de Nazaret, la Virgen María, a cooperar en su plan salvífico: Ella será la madre de su Hijo unigénito, el Señor Jesús. A la propuesta divina, la "Llena de Gracia" responde con un valiente y generoso "¡Sí!" (cf. Lc 1,26-38). Y desde ese preciso momento las puertas del cielo empiezan a abrirse nuevamente y la amistad entre Dios y el hombre, quebrada antaño por el pecado, quedará restablecida. Por ese 'sí' la Virgen quedará encinta por obra del Espíritu Santo, y será elevada a la condición de Madre de Dios. Llevará a Jesús en el vientre: será primero abrigo y protección, y después la encargada de educar a Aquel que es salud del género humano.

La Anunciación este año se celebra mañana lunes 8 de abril, ya que el 25 de marzo cayó en Semana Santa.

Para que creas


No sucede demasiado a menudo que el autor de uno de los libros de la Biblia se dirija directamente a nosotros para explicarnos por qué está escribiendo lo que está escribiendo. En la lectura del Evangelio de este domingo, que pertenece a la conclusión del Evangelio según san Juan, el



autor nos dice que ha elegido escribir estos acontecimientos para que "crean que Jesús es el Mesías, el Hijo de Dios, y para que, creyendo, tengan vida en su Nombre" (20:31). La carta de san Juan retoma esta idea diciendo que: "todo el que cree que Jesús es el Cristo ha nacido de Dios" (5:1); lo que llamaríamos "nacer de nuevo". Nuestra lectura de los Hechos de los Apóstoles para este Segundo Domingo de Pascua nos muestra exactamente qué sucede cuando los creyentes nacen de nuevo por medio de la fe.

SAN DIONISIO DE CORINTO (SIGLO II)

Mucho menos vistoso y popular que su homónimo de París, de este san Dionisio sólo sabemos que fue griego, obispo de Corinto hacia el año 171 y que escribió una serie de cartas pastorales a diversas




iglesias, algunos de cuyos fragmentos se conservan gracias a Eusebio. Nada de fantasía y de leyendas, como en el caso del saint Denis francés, sólo dos realidades escuetas v sustanciosas, su dignidad episcopal y su encendido celo por comunicar la verdad, por escribir y escribir, sabiéndose administrador de unos principios de vida con los que había que encender el mundo. Escribió a los lacedemonios con el título de La paz y la unidad sobre la doctrina católica, a los atenienses sobre la vida evangélica que deben observar, a la iglesia de Nicomedia contra las herejías de Marción, y también a los cristianos de Candía y del Ponto. A un obispo le aconseja que no se empeñe en hacer guardar a todos castidad absoluta, y que sea comprensivo con la flaquezas de la carne, haciendo que se casen los que no se atreven a perseverar en la virginidad. «Sin altanería, blasonad de la verdad; sin dureza, pelead por la verdad», esto, que es de san Agustín, parece muy propio aplicarlo a nuestro Dionisia, que no sólo se ocupa de los fieles de su diócesis, sino que no se juzga entremetido exhortando también a los de regiones muy apartadas, considerándose a sí mismo responsable de ellos. Apóstol sin fronteras, que viaja sin moverse de Corinto por obra de la pluma y el papel, su voz se oye en todo el Mediterráneo para que sea mar de nuestra fe. elredondelito.es

En tiempos pasados, cuando la Misa era en latín, no teníamos la oportunidad de escuchar en nuestra propia lengua las bellas palabras que Cristo pronunció durante la Última Cena y que el sacerdote repite durante la Consagración: "Esto es mi cuerpo". . . "Esta es mi sangre". Por tal razón los monaquillos sonaban unas campanitas indicando que algo importante estaba pasando. En ese momento los fieles levantábamos la cabeza para ver el pan convertido en cuerpo y el vino convertido en sangre. Lamentablemente el sacerdote nos daba la espalda y no podíamos ver lo que ocurría sobre el altar. Sin embargo, respondíamos con las palabras del apóstol Tomás: "Señor mío y Dios mío". Estas palabras reconocen y adoran la presencia de Jesús en el pan y el vino. A este momento se le consideraba el más importante de la Misa. No obstante, el Concilio Vaticano II vino a enseñarnos que este es el momento cumbre, junto con toda la Plegaria Eucarística, pues toda la Misa es igualmente importante, excepto que durante la Plegaria Eucarística alcanzamos el punto más alto de la celebración. Por esa razón ya no hay campanita, pues ahora escuchamos todo en nuestro propio idioma, así como los discípulos las escucharon de Cristo, en su propio idioma. -Fray Gilberto Cavazos








It is not often that the author of one of the books of the Bible comes right out and tells us directly why he is writing what he is writing. In this Sunday's Gospel reading, taken from the conclusion of John's Gospel, the author tells us that he has chosen to record these events so "that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the

Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name" (20:31). The letter of John echoes this idea by saying that "everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ is begotten by God" (5:1)-what we might refer to as being "born again." Our reading from the Acts of the Apostles for this Second Sunday of Easter shows us exactly what it looks like when believers are born again - Arch 18 JSP through faith.



Sometimes children acquire nicknames in childhood that stalk them through adulthood: "Pinky," "Boo-boo," and the like. This Sunday was once called "Low Sunday," a step down from Easter glory, and an unfortunate nickname since Easter rejoicing goes on for fifty days. Traditionally this is the day when the




newly baptized put away their white baptismal robes and returned to their everyday life after a week of intense celebration. Of course, the goal was to take up everyday duties with a very new point of view. A long title for the day was Dominica in albis deposito, or "The Lord's Day for Putting Away the Albs," so no wonder the nickname "Low Sunday" arose. In the old calendar it was also called "Quasimodo Sunday," after the first word of the opening chant, Quasimodo geniti infantes, or "As newborn infants," a reference to the newly baptized taken from the Epistle of Peter. Victor Hugo's bell-ringing hero in The Hunchback of Notre Dame was abandoned as an infant on the threshold of the cathedral of Paris on Low Sunday, 1467, and named "Quasimodo" for the feast. -Rev. James Field
