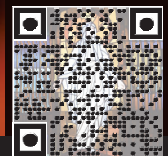

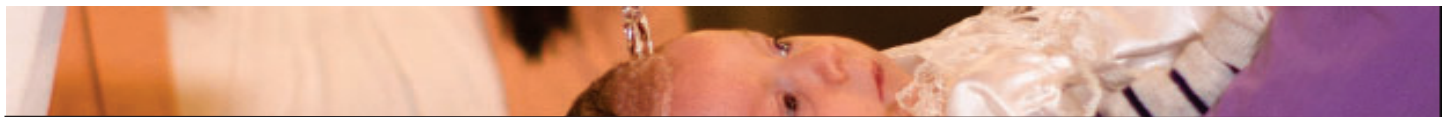

REFLECTING ON GOD'S WORD AND LIVING OUR FAITH EACH DAY

September 28, 2025
26th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY
TIME: BEING ACCOUNTABLE

A reflection on the first reading from the prophet Amos can be stated as: we do have freedom of choice, but we are not free to avoid the consequences of our actions, or our inaction. In the prayer of the penitential rite, "I confess to almighty God..." we ask pardon for what we have done and what we have failed to do. Today's Responsorial Psalm pleads that like the Lord, we might remain faithful, compassionate, vulnerable and generous. These qualities are complemented by those mentioned by St. Paul in his letter to Timothy, what it means to be a disciple of Christ Jesus.

But it is the Gospel that catches our attention – that the choices we make now will have lasting impact. The parable of the rich man and Lazarus reminds us that we each are accountable for what we have been given and how we attend to the poor and those in need. Jesus is not condemning those who have wealth and are comfortable; the parable shows us that we need to be aware of and responsive to the needs of others. The parable points to the "Last Judgment" section of Matthew's Gospel chapter 25: "What you do to the least of my people you do to me." Do we see, attend and serve, or ignore and disdain those in need?

Remembering that there are many ways of being in need, I recall an article I read some time ago in a mission magazine titled "NOT ALL WOUNDS BLEED." The missionary author spoke pointedly of his own "conversion" – from seeing others only "as people to help" shift to seeing others with the eyes and heart of faith and recognizing God within those he encounters. The lens of faith changes who and what we see. When we are sent forth from the Liturgy, we are commissioned to love and serve God and one another. May we see God's grace for us in difficult times as well as in good times, and find more ways to see and celebrate God's grace and goodness, to share what we have with others.

As Father Richard Rohr writes, God comes to us disguised as our daily lives. Whether we are looking out our door, around the neighborhood, at the city or the world, God is there, sometimes hidden in the least, the lost and the last. But God is there. And God is here, with us and within us. How are we living, doing, as missionary disciples?

It was a special emphasis of Pope Francis, continuing under the guidance of Pope Leo, that as Catholics in the world today we take seriously our call to be leaven in the world, to be true apostles, sharing our gifts of faith and love.

SPECIAL PRAYERS



There are prayers in the Roman Missal, and in our small missals, that we, as a gathered community of faith at Mass, often neglect to pray. They are the Antiphons or "Chants",

and there are two at each Mass. The **Entrance Antiphon** opens the liturgy entrance rite with a very short scriptural prayer related to the theme or feast of the Mass and its readings and is said or sung when there is no Entrance song, as the celebrant and ministers process to the sanctuary. The other is the **Communion Antiphon**, a scripture verse or refrain from a psalm related to the feast or prayers of the Mass; this chant is to be said after the celebrant receives his communion and before Communion is given to the congregation. Again, when there is no sung hymn, the antiphon is said by reader, a minister or even the celebrant himself.

It is a joy to pray these two antiphons together during the weekday Masses when there is no formal choir, and these short prayers can be said as part of our prayer time when we cannot go to daily Mass. They are usually not said aloud during our Sunday or feast day Masses when the choir takes a significant role in leading our liturgical sung prayer. These two short thematic prayers are part of what is called the "Proper" of the Mass, those prayers which are chosen according to the Mass of the day.

The two antiphons for **Monday** the 29th, the **feast of Archangels** Saints Michael, Gabriel and Raphael, are: Entrance: "Bless the Lord, all you his angels, mighty in power, fulfilling his word and heeding his voice.", and the Communion chant: "I will thank you, Lord, with all my heart; in the presence of the angels, I will praise you." There is a special delight in these short prayers that introduce and echo the feast and connect them with our own daily thoughts.

Una reflexión sobre la primera lectura del profeta Amós puede expresarse así: Tenemos libertad de elección, pero no somos libres para evitar las consecuencias de nuestras acciones, ni de nuestra inacción. En la oración del rito penitencial, “Yo confieso ante Dios todopoderoso...”, pedimos perdón por lo que hemos hecho y por lo que hemos dejado de hacer. El Salmo Responsorial de hoy suplica que, como el Señor, permanezcamos fieles, compasivos, vulnerables y generosos. Estas cualidades se complementan con las que menciona San Pablo en su carta a Timoteo, sobre lo que significa ser discípulo de Cristo Jesús.

Pero es el Evangelio el que capta nuestra atención: Las decisiones que tomamos ahora tendrán un impacto duradero. La parábola del hombre rico y Lázaro nos recuerda que cada uno es responsable de lo que ha recibido y de cómo atiende a los pobres y necesitados. Jesús no condena a quienes tienen riqueza y viven cómodamente; la parábola nos muestra que debemos estar conscientes y responder a las necesidades de los demás. Esta enseñanza apunta a la sección del “Juicio Final” en el capítulo 25 del Evangelio según San Mateo: “Lo que hicieron con el más pequeño de mis hermanos, lo hicieron conmigo.” ¿Vemos, atendemos y servimos, o ignoramos y despreciamos a quienes están en necesidad?

Recordando que hay muchas formas de estar en necesidad, recuerdo un artículo que leí hace tiempo en una revista misionera titulado “NO TODAS LAS HERIDAS SANGRAN.” El autor misionero hablaba con sinceridad de su propia “conversión”: de ver a los demás solo “como personas a las que ayudar” a verlos con los ojos y el corazón de la fe, reconociendo a Dios en aquellos con quienes se encuentra. El lente de la fe transforma a quién y qué vemos. Cuando somos enviados desde la Liturgia, somos comisionados para amar y servir a Dios y a los demás. Que podamos ver la gracia de Dios en los tiempos difíciles así como en los buenos, y encontrar más maneras de ver y celebrar la bondad y la gracia de Dios, compartiendo lo que tenemos con los demás.

Como escribe el Padre Richard Rohr: Dios viene a nosotros disfrazado de nuestra vida cotidiana. Ya sea que miremos desde nuestra puerta, por el vecindario, la ciudad o el mundo, Dios está allí, a veces oculto en los más pequeños, los perdidos y los últimos. Pero Dios está allí. Y Dios está aquí, con nosotros y dentro de nosotros. ¿Cómo estamos viviendo y actuando como discípulos misioneros?

Fue un énfasis especial del Papa Francisco, continuando bajo la guía del Papa León, que como católicos en el mundo de hoy tomemos en serio nuestro llamado a ser levadura en el mundo, verdaderos apóstoles que comparten nuestros dones de fe y amor.

Oraciones Especiales



Hay oraciones en el Misal Romano, y en nuestros pequeños misales, que como comunidad reunida en la fe durante la Misa, a menudo olvidamos rezar. Son las Antífonas o

“Cánticos”, y hay dos en cada Misa. La Antífona de Entrada abre el rito de entrada litúrgico con una breve oración bíblica relacionada con el tema o la fiesta de la Misa y sus lecturas, y se dice o canta cuando no hay canto de entrada, mientras el celebrante y los ministros procesan hacia el presbiterio. La otra es la Antífona de Comunión, un versículo bíblico o estribillo de un salmo relacionado con la fiesta o las oraciones de la Misa; este canto se dice después de que el celebrante recibe la comunión y antes de distribuirla a la congregación. Nuevamente, cuando no hay himno cantado, la antífona puede ser proclamada por un lector, un ministro o incluso el mismo celebrante.

Es una alegría rezar estas dos antífonas juntos durante las Misas entre semana, cuando no hay coro formal, y estas breves oraciones pueden integrarse en nuestro tiempo de oración cuando no podemos asistir a Misa diaria. Por lo general, no se proclaman en voz alta durante las Misas dominicales o en días festivos, cuando el coro desempeña un papel importante en la oración litúrgica cantada. Estas dos breves oraciones temáticas forman parte de lo que se llama el “Propio” de la Misa, es decir, las oraciones que se eligen según la celebración del día.

Las dos antífonas para el lunes 29, la fiesta de los Santos Arcángeles Miguel, Gabriel y Rafael, son: Antífona de Entrada: “Bendigan al Señor, todos sus ángeles, poderosos ejecutores de su palabra, atentos a la voz de su mandato.” Antífona de Comunión: “Te daré gracias, Señor, con todo mi corazón; en presencia de los ángeles te cantaré.”

Hay un deleite especial en estas breves oraciones que introducen y reflejan la fiesta, y que se conectan con nuestros pensamientos cotidianos.

and the Rich Man

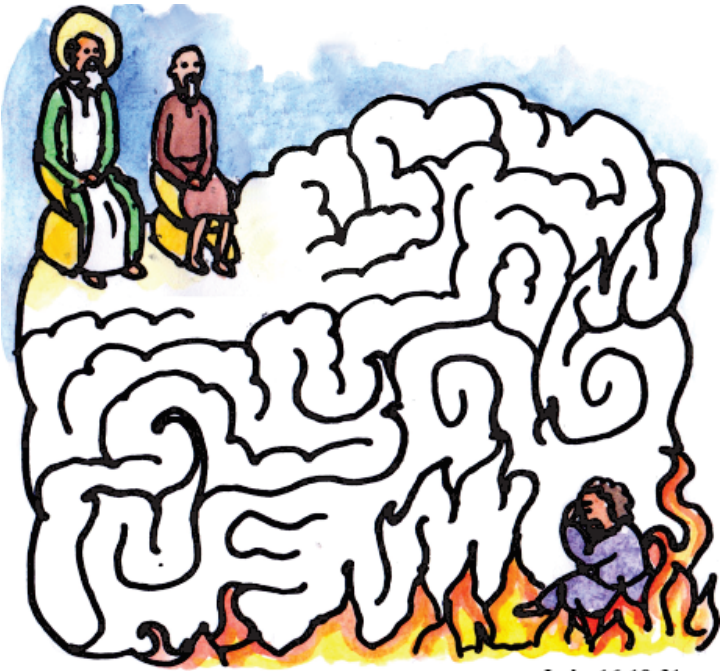

The message found in today's readings is an oft-told story. Citizen Kane, Daddy Warbucks, and King Midas are only a few of the familiar fictional characters who thought enormous wealth could buy happiness and fulfillment. Daddy Warbucks admitted stepping on a few people in his climb to the top. Kane tried to buy the printed word and stardom for his young wife, while King Midas conjured immense wealth and tragedy by his very touch. We learn clearly in today's readings that none of this is really possible. True happiness comes from caring for someone other than ourselves. It comes from the pursuit of the virtues Paul described to Timothy: faith, love, gentleness, godliness, righteousness, and endurance. The Gospel reminds us that we dare not ignore the needs of others, acting as though we don't notice their suffering. God's call to us is much too clear to disregard for even one more day.
